The Future of Art and Design Education:

President Karen Hofmann will discuss the shifting landscape of higher education and ArtCenter's response to those trends with its current strategic agenda and vision for the decade ahead.

Introducer: George Falardeau



Karen Hofmann is the president and chief executive officer at ArtCenter College of Design, an institution recently ranked the #1 Best Undergraduate Art School by Salary Potential according to the Georgetown University Center on Education and the Workforce. When she assumed the presidency on July 1, 2022, she captured several culturally significant milestones —she is the first woman, the first alumna and the first ArtCenter provost to hold the position.

In her role as the College's chief academic officer, she led academic leadership on a process to envision the "Future of Education 2030," to reimagine how ArtCenter prepares the next generation of creative leaders. She championed a strategic agenda with a focus on access, affordability and inclusion, taking an omnichannel approach to delivering art and design education and developing a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Action Plan to help broaden access to ArtCenter's offerings. And she expanded the College's exhibitions programming, further solidifying Pasadena as a must-stop destination for anybody interested in experiencing art and design. Most notably, she helped lead ArtCenter through the

pandemic, pivoting the College to a remote learning environment and ensuring a safe return to campus.

Karen served as chair of ArtCenter's Product Design department and has taught at the College since 2002. During that time she developed the DesignStormä collaborative design sprint project model. She

spent the earlier part of her career engaged in advanced design and research at Johnson Controls Automotive Systems Group.

She graduated from ArtCenter in 1997 with a Bachelor of Science in Product Design and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from California State University, Northridge in 1990.

Why am I up here? Past Presidents were called by **President Justene Adamec** to fill in one meeting each through July 1st and we're going to have fun!" He wasn't going to host the meeting, he was going to Be The Meeting!

With that, we were led in opening song by **Don Andrues**, who thought that since it was a game show, and luck is always the fun part, we sang "With a Little Bit of Luck" from My Fair Lady (by Lerner

• **PP Scott** introduced his husband, Tony Foster, playwright and puppeteer, and game show designer

• Jan Moscaret brought her visiting daughter and a former Rotarian, Lisa Burr.

• Lisa Kroese introduced Amy Sparrow Stand

Then **PP Scott** went back into Presidential mode and showed us a video of his fantastic timetraveling year, (in the Time Machine built by **Robert Lyons)** complete with period costumes of each decade of Pasadena Rotary's 100 years, each decade at a time, culminating in the time machine in action as **PP Scott** dashing into it in coat, hat, and tie, only to disappear behind the smoke and spiraling door. He then gave highlights of his year:

Charitable donations with a Centennial Gala that raised over \$180,000 for the Union Station kitchen renovation project

- · Celebrating the oldest and largest service club in the San Gabriel Valley
- · Wild stage effects of showcasing Pasadena Rotary's decades of service
- Navigating the worst pandemic shutdown in 100 years (way to go out in a Centennial year!)



He then brought back one of his fun events – Take Five – where he would interview a new member of the club for five minutes and ask then spontaneous questions to reveal their fun sides. He explained this was in his DNA – he would interview family and neighbors from the age of five, inspired by interviews he would see on talk shows growing up. He then called up **Lisa Kroese** to the stool, and she was just as game: her favorite skill she would like to try would be skiing, her guilty pleasure movies were Elf and Bird Cage, her favorite season would be Spring "because my birthday is in March, and I look good in Pink"; her favorite decade would be "Now" because she is finally old

enough to figure things out. And finally, where would she time travel to if she could, and she chose "The Future, because her husband works at JPL and is always telling me what the future will be like, and I want to go there, come back, and tell him he was wrong!"


