Ship to Shore:
A Conversation from the Pacific Ocean to Pasadena

Brandon will be on a research vessel docked in British Columbia, Canada. They have been conducting research and helping maintain and observe miles of underwater cable off the coast of British Columbia. The cables monitor things like earthquakes, ocean noise, seafloor tectonics, and so much more. Brandon will also talk about his favorite moments and fascinating things we have seen on other expeditions and interesting things we hope to discover while at sea. We have a lot of videos of fascinating organisms, the technology we use, and how we explore the deep sea.

Brandon Rodriguez is the Educator Professional Development Specialist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. With a background in chemistry, Brandon worked as a research scientist for several years, making bio-plastics for the Dow Chemical Company before finding a passion for education. He

shifted his career away from the private sector and into the classroom with 8 years of teaching high school and college chemistry and physics. This led him to a position in the Education Department at JPL in Pasadena, CA. In his role, Brandon gets to live in 'both worlds', performing research in young stellar object formation via IR astronomy and flying on NASA's SOFIA, while also writing curriculum and leading professional development for K-12 educators.

During his years at JPL and alongside his incredible team, he has conducted hundreds of workshops for students and teachers around the country, organized the televised programming for the Perseverance landing in 2021, and published dozens of classroom activities for educators everywhere.

President Justene introduced our speaker, Boon Lim of JPL's Blue Origin Lunar Architecture Program, who was speaking on The Small Satellite Revolution: The Future Came in Small Packages. Dr. Lim started off by sharing the mind-blowing fact that there are currently 7,700 satellites in orbit around the earth, and there are expected to be 10,000 by next year. He called this a "shocking proliferation" and an "accelerated growth curve" of satellite activity and noted that we are about to have tens of thousands of satellites in orbit. Then he posed the question: Why?

In 1999, the CubeSat satellite became standard: It's 10 x 10 x 10 centimeters – smaller than our Rotary bell. Having such a

small satellite makes it a lot cheaper and more efficient to go to space and also distributes the risk of failure. Instead of having one \$100 million satellite, you can launch 100 \$1 million satellites. If two of them fail, you still have \$98 million of your investment safe, instead of losing all of it. Moreover, these small satellites are so inexpensive to produce that even high schools can develop them for a cost of just \$20,000 to \$30,000.

Dr. Lim shared various programs that are providing opportunities for various people and organizations to design and launch satellites. The University Nanosatellite Program (UNP) is a defense competition for university students and programs in satellite design, and the winning designs are built and launched. It has been through eleven cycles since 1999. The NASA CSLI/ELaNa or CubeSat Launch Initiative was started in 2010 and has launched 15 satellites from all over the U.S.

Dr. Lim showed us drawings and diagrams demonstrating that satellites have gone from being as big as a building to being as small as a briefcase or a mini-fridge. However, he said, the tradeoff is the smaller satellites have less capability. It turns out, though, that the trade-off is largely worth it. He compared the larger satellites to a Michelin-star restaurant and the smallest ones to McDonald's, and noted that the mid-range satellites ("Chipotle or Olive Garden") have largely won the day. The most common satellite is the Starlink, which is about three times as tall as a person.

Dr. Lim then shared his experience as a CSLI recipient: his satellite, alas, blew up on the launch pad in 2014. However, in 2019 his team successfully launched one and launched another one just recently. The development cycle is quite rapid: Only three to four years.

Next, he shared some facts on the commercialization of space: NASA has started taking bets on companies other than Lockheed, McDonnell Douglas, and the other legacy space contractors.

Dr. Lim noted that those companies, accustomed to having billions of dollars at their disposal from NASA, have some "bad habits." NSAS has turned to smaller companies such as Orbital Sciences and SpaceX. SpaceX has successfully launched 297 times and now they are looking at sending commercial crews to space. These companies, said Dr. Lim, have shown how they can execute without costing a billion dollars.

These days we have a launch of a satellite every few days. Looking to the future, the takeaways are: 1) We are living in the middle of a space renaissance; 2) the cost for access to space has dropped dramatically, and 3) the commercialization of space is accelerating. We are in a new space race to get back to the moon, and Blue Origin has been selected as the Lunar Lander provider and three newish companies are in competition for the Lunar Terrain Vehicle.

After a very lively Q and A session, Dr. Lim was presented with his speaker gift and we all left, buzzing about the exciting developments in space!






