Chris Erskine worked for 30 years at the Los Angeles Times as an editor and writer, covering sports, travel, politics, family and entertainment. He was part of three Pulitzer Prize-winning teams for breaking news. His weekly humor pieces on life in suburban Los Angeles are probably his best-known work.

In 2018, he released "Daditude," a collection of his favorite Times columns on fatherhood. "What the Bears Know," released Oct. 3, is his fifth book and recently made The Times' best-seller list. He also contributed to the new Vin Scully book, "Perfect Eloquence," in bookstores now.

He is a native of Chicago and also worked at papers in New Orleans and Miami. He still pens weekly columns for eight papers around the Los Angeles.



#### RI Commits Funds to Polio Outbreak Response in Gaza

The recent detection of variant polio virus type-2 isolates in environmental samples and the confirmation of a 10-month-old child who has contracted polio in Gaza is a stark reminder that as long as polio exists anywhere, it is a threat everywhere.

The ongoing crisis in Gaza has contributed to reduced routine immunization rates and an increased risk of vaccine-preventable diseases, including polio. The crisis also poses a significant challenge to fully implementing disease surveillance and vaccination campaigns.

The World Health Organization (WHO) considers there to be a high risk for the spread of this polio strain within Gaza and internationally, particularly given the current situation's impact on public health services.

A humanitarian pause has allowed a two-round polio vaccination campaign that began in Gaza on 1 September. Initial reports indicate the campaign started successfully, with teams showing strong commitment and high levels of community participation.

Rotary is committing US\$500,000 to bolster the initiative, channeling these funds through a dedicated Polio Outbreak Response Fund. This contribution represents Rotary's sustained support to the WHO in combating polio globally.

Rotary will continue to work with its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and other agencies as vaccination efforts unfold.

Financial contributions to the PolioPlus fund will help Rotary and its Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners achieve a world in which no child is paralyzed by polio again.

Through the exceptional work by Dean Billman, we are trying to become a 100% club. Let's bring

it to the finish line!



At this point we have paid for 500 lifesaving pediatric heart surgeries in rural India and are starting our third tranche of surgeries this month.

Past President Mary Lou Byrne donated \$100 to the Polio Pig in honor of Past President Shel, explaining that being president of this Club is a hard job and Shel was her presidential mentor every step of the way. In other news, PP Mary Lou reminded everyone to order their End Polio Now t-shirts by October 4, so

**Alex Rocco** announced that the Mt. Baldy event has been rescheduled for October 18. Details below.

**Dean Billman** reminded everyone of the World Polio Day Run/Walk Around the Rose Bowl on October 24. Details below. He also urged everyone to join the Polio Plus Society for a \$100 donation. Finally, he donated \$100 to the Polio Pig in honor of his wife, Karen, whose Karen Billman Designs is featured in this month's Pasadena Magazine, and another \$100 in honor of PP Shel. Back in 2016 PP Shel was on a Rotary trip to Cambodia to see the water well we installed there, and when **PP Dave Mans** was injured, Shel stayed by his side until Dave could be safely evacuated, missing the Rotary International Convention in the process.

President Elect Hillary Shenk announced two upcoming IMPACT Club service projects: There is an in-person trash cleanup at Eaton Canyon on September 28 at 8 a.m. President Stephen will provide post-project coffee and donuts at his house. Be sure to wear waterproof shoes! **Mary Wilson** introduced our speaker. Ida Puliwa is a Rotarian from Malawi and the president and founder of Othakarhaka Foundation. Malawi is a very beautiful and peaceful country in Southeast Africa. Its population more than 19 million, of which 52% are women.

Ida said she was born in a community which never believed in the power of girls' education. Girls were treated as nothing. "Do you think I'm nothing?" she asked rhetorically, and of course we all replied with a resounding "NO!" However, because her mother only had girl children, she and her parents and sisters were kicked out of her father's family home when her father refused to take a second wife in hopes of having sons.

How did Ida rise from her humble beginnings? Ida explained, "On my first trip to a city, I saw a beautiful woman, beautifully



dressed, carrying a briefcase. My teacher told me 'if you work hard in school, you can go to university, and come to the city, get a job, and look like her.' That was my first role model – I worked hard in school until I became the first girl out of a community of 24,000 to graduate from high school." Alas, her parents were too poor to pay for university – it costs about \$5000 for four years in Malawi.

One day a professor from Virginia Tech came to Ida's village – her interpreter was sick, so Ida interpreted for her. And as a thank-you, the professor paid for Ida's college! Ida wanted to pay it forward and see more women and girls get educated.

In Malawi, Ida explained, you can't start anything without getting approval from the chief. He said, "You are just a girl – you should get married, have children, and take care of your children," But with support of many volunteers including her then-boyfriend now husband, she started the Passing on the Kindness Initiative. They agreed to work as a team to promote kindness. Everyone chipped in and the initiative started to grow and attract outside funding. Ida proudly said, "As I stand here now, we have grown from 65 to almost 6,800 volunteers and from one village to more than 57 villages and more than 500,000 people."

Ida detailed the programs her foundation provides:

**Girls' empowerment**: Rescue girls from illegal child marriages and send them back to school. The Foundation makes sure to find volunteers to take care of their babies. She shared the story of Chisomo, who was forced to marry at 12 and by 13 she had a baby. Now she is one of their best students who wants to be a medical doctor – if she hadn't been rescued Malawi would have lost a doctor in the future. So far, they have supported more than 600 girls and now 58 are now studying in universities.

Community Libraries and BloomBox Solar powered moveable computer library. Libraries are rare in Malawi, so students don't have access to adequate materials. They are bringing books and computers to the students.

**Sewing/tailing training and business establishment**: This is another way to empower girls who are rescued from child marriage but don't want to go back to school. When they graduate, they are given a sewing machine and they pay the Foundation back in one year so it can support the next class. They sew school uniforms for free, which are distributed to orphans.

**Public health care**: Palliative care, cervical cancer screening, and general clinic. Malawi's healthcare infrastructure is overburdened so there is no end-of-life care in public hospitals. The Foundation has volunteers to be caregivers to these patients in their own homes. They also have a children's clinic and free cervical cancer screening for all women, which is often only discovered once it is advanced.

**Sustainable agriculture and irrigation**: They are supporting families who would otherwise force their daughters into illegal child marriages. The families raise enough crops to sell and for their own consumption. They have reached out to more than 11,000 families, each of whom pays back a portion of their harvest for feeding others.

**Tree planting**: They plant seeds then distribute the seedlings in order to bring back the forest in Malawian communities.

**Community development**: This is an effort to provide better housing, food, homes, to orphans who lost parents to HIV/AIDS. Many of these orphans are being raised by grandparents, but they struggle. The Foundation also provides safe water.

Summing it up, Ida said "What I have seen is that if we can invest in both boys and girls, we can have better communities in the future."

All of the Foundations volunteers come from within the communities. Funding comes from the volunteers, who

from the beginning have each paid a minimum of \$.07/month. They also have partnerships with larger organizations who help with funding.

After a question and answer period, President Stephen presented Ida with her speaker gift, and also exchanged Rotary flags with her before adjourning the meeting at 1:30. (photo with Ida and her husband Ted Mwango)






