



It is located at the <u>Advanced Technologies Academy</u> ("A-Techâ€) which is a magnet public high school in Las Vegas, Nevada. A-Tech focuses on integrating technology with academics for students in grades 9–12. The magnet school program was founded in 1994 and is part of the Clark County School District. A-Tech was recently announced as the Number 1 high school in the entire state.

The 2024-2025 school year will be the second year of the Interact Club's existence. On 9/25/24 they held their officer installation for the next year. Five members of Southwest Rotary attended the installation.



Interact Club meetings are held monthly and Southwest Rotary members attend those meetings also. Green Valley Club Helps Project Marilyn with Period Supplies

On September 24, members from the Rotary Club of Green Valley met at Project Marilyn in Las Vegas to assemble a few hundred period supply kits. According to the nonprofit, period supplies are the least donated items when it comes to helping the community. Two in five females canâ€[™]t afford period supplies, and for the teens and women who are homeless, home insecure or living in a shelter, there is a lack of adequate storage space. Project Marilyn assembles period kits and distributes them to other nonprofits, such as shelters, libraries and schools. Each kit contains enough tampons, maxi pads and wipes to carry a person through their monthly cycle. The program also asks local businesses to hold kits on hand. Anyone in need can visit the businesses and organizations during regular business hours and ask "for the bag Marilyn left†them. For the one in four girls forced to miss school for lack of supplies, Project Marilyn is a gamechanger.
