President Randy Domigan asked Penny Wolff to come to the podium and introduce Kitty Lensman, the CEO of Public Media Connect/Think TV. Think TV is the newest corporate member.

Lisa Grigsby then took the podium and introduced our guest speaker, Chimene Mayne-Ross, the president of the Killer Brownie Company. Chimene talked about her family's history of innovation with Dorothy Lane Market, which was one of the first full-service supermarkets in the world. Dorothy Lane likes to have unique items, and in 1982 they started making killer brownies. In 2000, DLM split off Killer Brownie as a separate wholesale business.

Killer Brownies is the only company that solely makes brownies, and they have gone from a department of DLM with 6 employees to a 150-person business today.

Killer Brownies is successful because they focus on their employees and their core values: love, creativity, tenacity, and joy. All the Killer Brownies are made locally and they are part of the frozen supply chain. Half of their production is sold under private labels by other retailers. They have lots of seasonal flavors and package their product for use in retailers, restaurants, bakeries, and even United Airlines. Chimene said they do have a vegan (plant-based) brownie, but they can't make gluten-free brownies in their current bakery.

The Queen of Hearts drawing is more than \$2,000 right now. Walt Hibner's ticket was drawn, but he did not pull the Queen of Hearts.

Kristina Scott led the club in the Four Way Test.

Previously, she was the COO for CET/Think^{TV} when the two organizations merged in 2009 to form the regional corporation, Public Media Connect. Kitty joined Think^{TV} in 1999 and managed the Development, Communications, and Production efforts before becoming Station Manager in 2009 and then COO in 2015.

Kitty is also the President of the Ohio Educational Television Stations, Inc. and a member of the Public Broadcasting Management Association.

Kitty is a graduate of San Diego State University's Telecommunications and Film School with a minor in Business Management. She and her husband Rob enjoy time with family, cooking, playing golf, and spending time together on their horse farm in Champaign County.
