**"Dunbar 150: Celebrating Paul Laurence Dunbar & Sparking Community Involvement"**



This year is the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of poet and author Paul Laurence Dunbar. Our speaker, Park Ranger Angela Stewart, has been helping to coordinate the communities' activities to mark this occasion. She will discuss Paul Laurence Dunbar's life in addition to his creative contributions to culture as they continue to have relevance in 2022, 150 years after he was born. Dunbar 150 is an initiative by the National Park Service (NPS) with the purpose of serving as a connector to the community. She will address experiences, how NPS has approached this, the response and what we've learned.

Linda Groover then made the secretary's announcements and let us know who is celebrating birthdays this upcoming week, let us know that there were 21 participants via Zoom, updated us on the Crayons to Classroom fund raising drive and that the Queen of Hearts drawing was over \$3,000. Finally, Linda announced the Power 50 Women in Business for the area who include our own Cassie Barlow, Sharlet Briggs, Judy Buddi, Debbie Liebermann, and Kathleen Carlson. Day 10's were then given by Bill Nance (Day 10) in honor of the upcoming Woodland cemetery walking tour; Paul Buddi (Day 100) for the Washington Twp Roud-a-bout opening and his granddaughter's birthday; Kim Pollard (Day 10) in honor of her upcoming grand opening this weekend; Rick Schwartz (Day 24) for all those left handers; Kathleen Carlson (Day 100) in honor of being one of the Power 50 Women and being left handed; Surendra Singhvi (Day 10) in honor of India's 75th anniversary founding as a country; Doug Deutsch (Day 10) for his wife being a left-hander as well; Jean Maychack (Day 20) honoring those who recently died in Butler Twp.; and Linda Groover (Day 10) in honor of her son that recently learned he received a job offer from his internship.

Walt, also serving as the Chair of the Day, returned to the podium and reminded us to sign up for Rotary on the Road coming up on August 29 and told us the 4 businesses that will host the meetings—Requarth Lumber, Budde Sheet Metal, Five Rivers Health Center and The Modern College of Design. Thanks was given to Iris for organizing Rotary Dines out which took place at German Fest Picnic. Fun was had by all and was introduced to some non-conventional polka music. A \$3,000 foundation check was presented to Andrea Kennedy, Regional Director for Prevent Blindness Ohio. Andrea explained that the much needed funds will have a great impact on many in the area. For example, free vision screenings. Paul Harris awards were given to Doug Deutsch (his first) and to Tom Budde (his 4th). Walt then introduced us to our speaker, Charlie Simms.

Charlie is a 6<sup>th</sup> generation Daytonian and has been in the home development business for 35 years. He outlined the history of the housing industry since 9/11/2001 and how it has impacted where we are today. This is the highest ever seller's market that he has seen but expects the bubble to burst in the near future—house values will come down 10-15%. He explained that Simms Development currently has no inventory and continues to build cautiously in these tumultuous times. His company is looking to develop in Beavercreek, Centerville, the Wright Dunbar area and in Lebanon. They are also looking at property in Huber Heights.

Charlie then entertained several questions from the group. He discussed housing issues and pricing as they relate to the Airbnb market, how developers manage demands for vertical housing units for aging adults, the use of already existing structures for new housing projects, and how jobs and population growth affect the housing market. Simms Development is looking for ways to collaborate with Preservation Dayton and with Downtown Development. He addressed how the global supply chain issues affect local housing markets. Simms' company is mindful of sustainability issues and the company has made strides in that area as well as maintaining curb appeal of the units built. Charlie encouraged that owners of older homes can do small things that would help with "green" efforts. For example, home-owners are encouraged to bring older houses up to code by insulating the home.

There was no winner of the Queen of Hearts drawing and pot continues to grow! The meeting was adjourned.

Rotary Book Club met last week at the Wright Memorial Library and had an interesting discussion of the **Bosnia List** recommended by the Peace Museum.

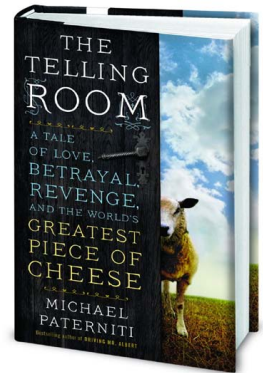
Another perspective of the Dayton Peace accords from people from Bosnia. But, it's time to move away from war and read something entertaining.
