November 25, 2024 TBD facts about him such as he and Fran Dewine first met in the first grade and married while students at Miami University. Governor DeWine's family started a seed business in Yellow Springs and he worked in all aspects of the business. During the 1974 Xenia tornado, Mike was in a building right in the path of the storm. Bill then introduced Governor Mike DeWine to the club.

Governor Mike DeWine talked about an important announcement he made just prior to attending today's Rotarymeeting about the state's second Innovation Hub, an advanced project to secure a 120,000 Sq Ft building that will

be located on the old fairgrounds site across from Miami Valley Hospital. It's a partnership between University of Dayton, Wright Patt Air Force Base, Premier Health and a number of other organizations. The project will make Dayton the epicenter, the biggest place in the world, in regard to digital technology for the Air Force. The number of people who go into Wright Patterson Air Force Base has doubled. At one time it was 19,000 and now there are now 38,000 people working there every day. The state has put \$35 million into the project as well as a promise of up to \$95 million from state, local and private partners. It's all about creating the jobs of the future.

Governor DeWine talked further about jobs of the future. He had an opportunity to talk with Dr. Johnson of Sinclair Community College and met some of his graduates, one of whom received her Sinclair education, the beginning of it at least, while in prison. One of the things he would like to do is expand that initiative even further, to include more people who are in prison. The goal is to provide people coming out of prison with the tools that they need to be able to make a living and to move on with their life. Sinclair continues to do a really amazing job.

Governor DeWine also talked about H2Ohio. The state of Ohio is doing more than any other state to preserve and protect our water. Itâ \in TM's one of the great assets we have when trying to get companies to come to Ohio, an abundance of water, and we kind of take it for granted. If you travel in the western part of the country, the southwest particularly, you hear a lot about water and the lack thereof. We have an obligation to preserve this water. A problem the state was facing was algae bloom in Lake Erie. It was caused by the runoff from fertilizer used on our farms. The state did a study and looked at the algae bloom problem and came up with two solutions. One is to have farmers in the Maumee Bay Basin, basically northwest Ohio, develop better farming practices with less runoff into Lake Erie. The second is bolstering the number of wetlands. Those wetlands are really a natural filter. Itâ \in TM's not just about Lake Erie, it's about the entire state.



In Greene County a new state park was opened called Great Council State Park, the 76th in the state. It is located on Rt 68 between Yellow Springs and Xenia. The route itself originally was a Native American pathway between the Ohio river and Detroit. Ohio is one of the few states where 60% of the visitors to our state parks go there just for the day, there's absolutely no cost to the visitor.

Fun factoid Governor DeWine asked about was, prior to him becoming governor of Ohio who was the last person from the Miami Valley to become Governor of Ohio? It was James Cox. DeWine joked and said, well, maybe in another hundred years we'II have another governor of the state from the Miami Valley. Interestingly, Cox was the governor during the Spanish Flu, when Cox wrote his autobiography not one word was mentioned about the flu.

Governor DeWine acknowledged that he needed to keep a tight timeline at a Rotary meeting. One time when Cox was addressing a Rotary club in 1932 he extended the closing time by an hour and a half, which DeWine was certainly not going to be guilty of himself. At which time, he took questions from the floor.

President Randy Domigan thanked the Governor for taking time to talk to the Dayton Rotary Club and introduced Jeremy Turner, this week's 60 second member spotlight.

Jeremy owns Apply Pressure Washing and Restoration as well as Sky Contracting. Apply Pressure does house washing, window cleaning, concrete cleaning, and sealing as well as deck cleaning and staining. While Apply Pressure cleans all things on the exterior, Sky Contracting does roofing, siding, gutters, paint, demo, concrete masonry for residential, commercial and multifamily properties. 


