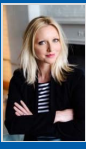

This Happened Last Monday...

Rotary on the Road took Rotarians to 4 different Rotarian Vocational Site as well as a few joining on ZOOM for a virtual experience. We thank each of our hosts: Alan Pippenger, Requarth Co; Jessica Barry, The Modern College; Tom Budde & Candice Budde, Budde Sheet Metal; and Kim Bramlage, Five Rivers Health Center which is where our SMILE reporter attended.



Driving up to the new Five Rivers Health Centers, Edgemont Campus was like pulling into a bright, beautiful beacon of hope in Dayton. Kim Bramlage met us in the lobby, which is bright, open and filled with light and beautiful artwork, including a mobile by Dayton artist, Terry Welker. We grabbed our lunches and began learning about Five Rivers Health Center. Their mission – Five Rivers Health Centers is committed to providing access to quality, comprehensive and respectful care for our patients and community. Five Rivers Health Centers was created in 2011. They combined three former Premier hospital residency clinic departments – Family Health, Medical Surgical (Internal Medicine), and Women's Health and received their Federally Qualified Hospital Center (FQHC) status in 2013. FQHCs are community-based organizations that provide comprehensive primary and preventative care to persons of all ages, regardless of their ability to pay, and help patients establish medical homes. Kim said one of the most important goals is to keep clients who do not have access to health care and/or insurance from going to the Emergency Room or Urgent Care for routine care. Their funding model is made up of 50% patient fees, 23% FQHC funding and 27% service reimbursement and pharmacy revenue.

Things that make them unique include their independent board of directors that is made up of at least 51% patients and includes reps from Public Health Dayton/Montgomery County, WSU's Boonshoft School of Medicine and the Dayton/Montgomery County Ombudsman office. Also, they partner with WSU BSOM with more than 200 residents and fellows at all of their Centers annually. Five Rivers Health maintains relationships with each patient and provides wrap-around services to improve overall health and well-being with services including: pharmacy, behavioral health, dieticians, community health workers, care coordinators and produce perks, medical/legal partnerships and much more. Five Rivers Health's team consists of 270 providers and staff. The majority of patients served are from medically underserved areas of Montgomery County. 71% of their patients are living 100% below the Federal Poverty line.

Five Rivers Health Centers went from serving 12,000 patients in 2011 to serving 28,000 in 2019. Their newest location is the Edgemont Campus. They will serve approximately 16,000+ patients annually at this facility. They have 7 other locations located in and around Dayton. There was lively discussion about the healthcare climate in Dayton, and how Five Rivers Health Centers is such an asset to our community.

Rotary Book Club met last week at the Wright Memorial Library and had an interesting discussion of the **Bosnia List** recommended by the Peace Museum.

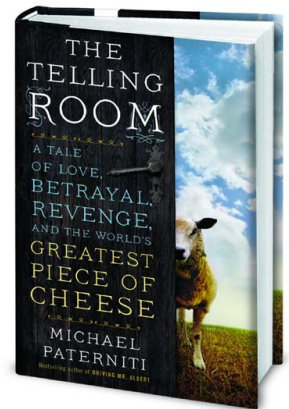
Another perspective of the Dayton Peace accords from people from Bosnia. But, it's time to move away from war and read something entertaining.
