- b. Susan Hayes introduced Mollie Hauser. Mollie is the widow of Dick Hauser who is a former long time member of Rotary. In business, Mollie was a transcriber at Granview Hospital. She retired from Dean investment associates. She's an avid historian. Her husband was always by her side.

Chair of the Day: Carolyn Rice

1. Introduced Ambassador Tony Hall. Tony served as Dayton's congressman from 1979 until 2002. He then was appointed by President George Bush to serve as the United States Ambassador to the United Nations Agencies for Food and Agriculture. He was recently honored with the Dayton Peace Award for his work with the Hall Hunger Initiative's work in Dayton. He was instrumental in creating Gem City Market
2. Tony Hall:
 - a. In his first campaign, he had a good opponent. In the last two weeks of the campaign, it looked like he was going to win. He was told by his assistant that Time Magazine was on the phone for him and wanted to speak to him. He spoke to his advisors and decided he was going to make a big statement to Time magazine and the world. He had 3 things he wanted to say. But when he got on the phone with them, they only asked if he would be renewing his subscription. His career is focused around hunger and peace. Gem City Market is one of the best community partnerships he's ever had. He has visited over 120 countries. Hunger is the result of violence, war, dictators, and corruption. Mostly, children face starvation. They lose hope and lose their homes. He saw 25 children die in the time span of 15 minutes during a trip he took to Ethiopia early in his career. He was with Mother Teresa's group. 100,000 people in Ethiopia were running from war, exhausted. These people laid down for rest and many died. On their way out, Tony's car came under fire. His driver ran away as Tony and his aide hid in a ditch. Tony drove the car back to the airport where they flew back to the Ethiopian capital of Addis Ababa. They were staying with the US Ambassador to Ethiopia who stayed in a massive, beautiful mansion in the center of the capital city. They ate dinner there – Tony, his aide, and the ambassador to Ethiopia. They had a huge feast. Mounds of food were on the table – enough to feed 200 people. But there were only three of them. They were waited on hand and foot by white-gloved servants. That contrast from what he saw in the villages to his experience at that dinner is what made him decide he was going to dedicate his career to hunger. He later wrote legislation to stop blood diamonds. At the time, the US bought 60% of blood diamonds. In these villages in Sierra Leone where the blood diamonds came from, people were missing limbs and ears. The warlords gathered the men in these villages and would tell them to run to the river. "First one to the river survives", the warlords would say to the village men. Sometimes the warlords would cut off the right hand of every man in the village and then have them run to the river – only to have the men die from bleeding out before they got there. Tony's legislation in congress was responsible for stopping 90% of the blood diamonds coming into the United States. He went to North Korea. North Korea is a closed nation. People in North Korea eat grass, bark, and twigs. They had no medicine. No antibiotics. No anesthesia. Cannibalism was rampant in North Korea. People didn't leave their dead family members outside at night because they would be eaten. Last week, Tony and his two closest friends from congress were recruited by congress to go and tell them how to get along. To have peace, you need relationships. To have peace, you need to pray together. To have peace, you need to eat together. He voted for war and against war. He voted for more taxes and for less taxes. He voted for treaties and as an ambassador to the UN, he signed treaties on behalf of the United States. None of that works. What works to create peace is spending time together. What works for peace is things like the Gem City Market. What works is praying together.
 - b. Question for Tony: How do we get along?
 - i. Vote. People in congress are scared of nothing more than the vote. If you don't approve of their hatred and partisanship, then vote them out of office.
3. Carolyn Rice introduced the Irv Bieser Peace Award to Amaha Sellassie of the Gem City Market for their role in creating peace in the community.
 - a. Amaha Sellassie: thanked Rotary for being instrumental in creating the Gem City Market. Rotary's grant of \$50,000 was the first large donation secured by the Gem City Market. It was after Rotary led the way, that other large donors started to follow. Amaha said projects like the Gem City Market are the pathway to a beloved community.

President Walt Hibner then adjourned the meeting.
