Dennis Andersh, President & CEO of Parallax Advanced Research and Dr. John Sankovic, President & CEO of the Ohio Aerospace Institute will present "Connecting Ohio's Applied Research for Business Growth" to Dayton Rotary. in the summer of 2015. After 2 years of planning, financing and building the brewery in Athens, Ohio from an abandoned mechanic's shop. Jimmy came from a career in molecular diagnostics and wanted to start a brewery that tapped into the "third spaces" concept—similar to European coffee houses. Little Fish opened in Athens on the outskirts of town and away from OU's campus. It strived to be a different sort of craft brew scene.

Little Fish incorporates sustainability concepts and supports the local economy by using Ohio farm grown ingredients, such as Ohio heirloom corn and spelt for use in its pilsners and Saison du Poisson, its flagship saison. Little Fish also relies on local farmers for Ohio grown hops, malted barley, wheat, rye, corn and locally grown fruits and vegetables. Jimmy explained that it gives him pride and satisfaction to support local farmers and he enjoys receiving the quality products they provide. In 2018, the Athens operation expanded by adding a kitchen and production capacity in order to become a farm-to-table restaurant. Not only would great beers be served but they added food to the mix. In order to make that expansion, Little Fish partnered with executive chef and butcher, Becky Clark. Becky has helped them create an ever-changing food menu that works in tandem with its brews.

In 2020, Little Fish brought in bakery services in house. In 2022, Little Fish Station opened right here in Dayton on Webster Street. When asked, Jimmy explained that Little Fish was drawn to Dayton because of its recent downtown revitalization efforts. He witnessed this transformation while he was wholesaling his brews. He grew to love the area and his wife has roots in Piqua and his family is from the Springfield area. What really sold him on Dayton was the number of owner-operated businesses that were thriving here. He fell in love with the run-down building on Webster that he was shown by the realtor. It provided the space, vibe, lighting that reminded him of the Athens area.

Jimmy entertained other questions from the group, including if Little Fish served gluten free beer. While most of the brews use a clarifying agent in the processing and can be considered gluten reduced, none are currently considered gluten free. Little Fish is not a large enough brewery to make no alcohol brews. The Dayton Station has 20 taps for products they make so there isn't a need for a "tap take over". They named the brewery Little Fish based on the desire to be a boutique version, or the little fish, to the larger breweries that exist. Jimmy explained that it is an important part of the business model that local farmers should receive a fair price for what they produce. The sustainability factor is important to Little Fish customers, even if it means that prices are a bit higher than those restaurants that get their food from large suppliers. He doesn't see sours replacing IPAs and offered first time sour drinkers to Little Fish's raspberry-based sour as an introduction to that type of brew. Little Fish will continue its mission of being a community space and offer live music. Sadly, there were no samples for the group to taste.

Queen of Hearts continues to elude us! Adam Horseman drew the 10 of Clubs. There are now just 7 cards left. The meeting was adjourned.
