"Service Above Self" is Rotary's motto, and the Unsung Hero Recognition Program encourages our youth to excel in this area while working behind the scenes and seldom, if ever, stepping into the limelight. Rotary will honor and publicly recognize high school seniors from public, private and parochial schools in Jefferson County. These students will receive a \$500 savings bond and a certificate of achievement. In addition, all Unsung Hero recipients and finalists who are pursuing a post-secondary education in Jefferson County will be eligible to apply for matching scholarships from Bellarmine University, Spalding University, University of Louisville, and Jefferson Community and Technical College. Scholarships range from \$1,000 to \$16,000 for a total of \$42,000.

School administrators have indicated that the Unsung Hero Recognition Program generates many positive results to their school and community because it stresses the importance of students volunteering. Our involvement enables Rotary to become known as the organization that cares about the future of our youth, and that we are investing in the next generation of decision-makers.
