

As founding President and Chief Executive Officer of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS), Dr. Michael B. McCall oversees a system of 16 individually accredited comprehensive community colleges with over 70 locations serving over 97,000 students. KCTCS has an annual operating budget of approximately \$929 million, and touches the lives of more than 500,000 citizens. Under the leadership of President McCall, KCTCS is committed to serving as the major gateway to postsecondary education for all Kentuckians. Since his appointment in December 1998, Dr. McCall has achieved many successes. Since 1998, more than 700 credit program options that result in certificates, diplomas or associate degrees have been ratified or approved by the KCTCS Board of Re-

gents. And, under McCall's leadership, KCTCS has become the largest provider of postsecondary education in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, representing 48.5% of all undergraduate college students.

The recipient of multiple awards, Dr. McCall has been recognized for his advanced collaborative partnerships, economic development, innovative use of technology and the utilization of team-oriented management. In addition, he serves on numerous boards and commissions. Prior to his appointment as founding president of KCTCS, Dr. McCall served as President of South Carolina's comprehensive technical college system and provided leadership for South Carolina's economic development training programs.

Dr. McCall received his bachelor's degree in physics and mathematics from the University of Carolina at Wilmington; his master's in physics from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, Blacksburg, Virginia, and his doctorate in educational administration from VPI.

April 10, 2014 Rotary Meeting

At the podium for the April 10th meeting in the Archibald Room there was another familiar face—that of Past President Stuart Alexander. He called us to "a moment of silence" to remember fellow Rotarian since 1987, Dr. Barry Ceridan, D.D.S, who had died after a long bout with cancer and whose smiling face hovered over us from the projection screen. The Rev. Charles Brockwell led us in the Invocation before our Pledge of Allegiance and a rousing rendition of "The Caissons Go Rolling Along", in honor of our speaker for the day. Visiting Rotarians from California and Lexington were introduced, as were five guests.

Paul Bickel III introduced our speaker, Colonel Walter M. Herd. a 20-year veteran of the US Army, now the National Director of Army Transition, operating out of Fort Knox. While his own military experience in Special Forces would have made an exciting talk, he came to "talk to Louisville Business leaders" about the benefits of hiring men and women who are now returning to civilian life with Honorable Discharges after several years of service in our Armed Forces.



Colonel Herd spoke of the advantage of hiring retired military personnel because of the qualities of life they have learned. They are seasoned team members who have learned discipline and reliability which are valuable to every employer building up a work force in a civilian, competitive marketplace. In the Army and Navy they have learned trades and mastered skills similar to many civilian trades and jobs, and they have proved their "staying power" on a job. He listed valuable attributes developed in the military that make these seasoned veterans more reliable than many bright eyed High School and college graduates who have yet to prove themselves. The Colonel also described the help that soldiers receive from the Army in résumé preparation and interviewing skills needed when entering the civilian work force.

In his introduction, reference was made to his book "Unconventional Warrior" which was published recently, and which was praised by a Rotarian during the question-answer period at the end of his talk.
