Dr. Neville G. Pinto was appointed the eighth dean of the J. B. Speed School of Engineering by the UofL Board of Trustees on June 9, 2011. A member of the University of Cincinnati's engineering faculty since 1985, Pinto served as Vice Provost & Dean of the Graduate School from 2006 until August 2011, Interim Associate University Dean for Graduate Studies from 2005 to 2006, Assistant Dean for Graduate Studies, College of Engineering from 2002 to 2006, and chemical engineering department chairman from 1993 to 1997.

and master's degree at The Pennsylvania State University where he also received his doctoral degree in 1985. He has been awarded 35 contracts and grants and has secured two patents.

During his tenure at the University of Cincinnati, Dr. Pinto served on Governor Ted Strickland's Higher Education Transition Leadership Team, 2006; Ohio Board of Regents Advisory Council on Graduate Education, 2006-2011; and State of Ohio Hazardous Waste Facility Board, 1993-2003. Pinto was elected Fellow of the Graduate School University of Cincinnati, a lifetime appointment by Board of Trustees based on outstanding scholarly attainment, and was elected to National Academy of Inventors in 2010 in recognition of US patents awarded. He is a member of American Institute of Chemical Engineers, American Society for Engineering Education, and Tau Beta Pi Engineering Honor Society.

Dr. Pinto and his wife, Dr. Jennifer L. Pinto, have three children.

April 17, 2014 Rotary Meeting

The meeting began with a lovely invocation by Larry Sloan, Sustaining Member and Paul Harris Fellow. President Randy recognized several milestone members that included the terrific Cliff Elgin – Paul Harris Fellow 5-stone pin, and Service Above Self extraordinaire, Craig Scherman. Member Dr. Tony Newberry introduced keynote speaker, Dr. Michael McCall. Dr. McCall spoke about the state's college system and the work of Jefferson Community & Technical College (JCTC) where he is chancellor. He began by thanking the Rotary for its commitment, one that has allowed many at -risk high school students to make college a real possibility

for their future. This partnership has been actively supported by the group and led by Henry Heuser, Jr. It will parlay into \$2 million for higher education funding, allowing the seed to be planted early for those who want to become college graduates even against recognized odds. It has included both financial support and mentoring programs.

JCTC has over 73 locations within a 30-minute drive from anywhere in Kentucky. It is the largest provider of higher education within the state focusing on specialty classes that include: North American Racing Academy (jockey accreditation), the Coal Academy, First Responder certification and others. Dr. McCall closed by again thanking the group, recognizing Dr. Tony Newberry and Dr. Donna Hargens.

The meeting concluded with a check presentation of \$250,000 to JCTC, and several free drawings. - Stacy Funk
