Jerry Abramson was elected Kentucky's Lieutenant Governor in November 2011. Before running for statewide office, Abramson was the longest-serving mayor in the city of Louisville's history, having won election to five terms, two of them during a merged city and county government.

Throughout his 21 years as mayor, Abramson oversaw a dramatic transformation of Louisville and was known for creating public/private partnerships to further policy goals. In 2008, the U.S. Conference of Mayors acknowledged Abramson's impact when it named Louisville - "America's Most Livable Large City."

As lieutenant governor, Abramson brings the knowledge, enthusiastic ideas and local government experience he demonstrated in Louisville to serve the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. Whether it's working with the private sec-

tor to create more jobs or ensuring educational opportunities are available for every citizen, Abramson supports Governor Steve Beshear's mission to make Kentucky the best state in the nation. He currently chairs the Governor's Blue Ribbon Commission on Tax Reform.

A lifelong Kentuckian, Abramson received a B.S. in business economics from Indiana University and a law degree from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. He served in the U.S. Army from 1969-1971. Abramson previously served in state government as general counsel to Kentucky Governor John Y. Brown, Jr. from 1979-1981.

He and his wife, Madeline, live in Louisville and have one son, Sidney.



Rotary Meeting - August 2, 2012

President Stuart Alexander rang the bell promptly at 12:15, calling the meeting to order. Merrill Moter offered the invocation and Bob Slider led us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Rotary's own, "The Four Way Best" offered their take on the famous Willie Nelson song, "On the Road Again".

Cyndi Caudill introduced the birthday table and the club sang "Happy Birthday" with Charlie Castner accompanying on the piano. Other announcements and business included recognition of Turney Berry being named a Director of the Regional Cancer Center Corporation, Jeanne Curtis being named as a Vice President for the Kentucky Association of Manufacturers and Bob Patterson (Former President of Consumers Choice Coffee), who was highlighted in a recent Business First article for starting his new accounting firm. John Evans introduced the newest member of the club, Charlie Farnsley, Vice President-Investments at The Benefits Firm.



Steve presented several photos, each set taken from approximately the same location and direction, to compare how Louisville appeared at different times during the last century with how it currently appears. During the presentation, he reminded us that Louisville has always been rooted in transportation. Louisville was originally settled near The Falls of the Ohio since it formed a natural barrier and necessary stopping point for river traffic. Originally, steamboats provided the majority of transportation. Then came the L&N Railroad and now UPS, so the community has always been a logistics hub for this part of the country.

One striking photo set showed an area of central downtown, emanating from Fourth and Main and perhaps covering 20 square blocks, in which the buildings have all been destroyed and replaced - with the building housing Actors Theater being the sole exception. Steve commented that we had lost a big piece of history in that area over the past half-century and cautioned that when we demolish a landmark, we should replace it with another landmark rather than bland, non-descript buildings.

After questions, President Stuart invited those interested to stay for a screening of the Past Presidents video shown at the Centennial Party. The next meeting will be August 9 in the Galt House West's Archibald Room. Lieutenant Governor Jerry Abramson will be our guest speaker. The meeting adjourned at 12:55. - Alan Singleton

A little club history ...

The following "Objects" and "Elements of Rotarianism" were in the first Rotary Club of Louisville Roster dated November 11, 1912.

OBJECTS

"To promote the recognition of the worthiness of all legitimate occupations, and to dignify each member's occupation as affording him an opportunity to serve society.

- "To encourage high ethical standards in business and professions.
- "To increase the efficiency of each member by the exchange of ideas and business methods.
- "To promote the scientizing of acquaintance as an op-portunity for service and an aid to success.

"To quicken the interest of each member in the public welfare and to co-operate with others in civic develop-ment."—Article 2, Constitution.

"A member is not **obligated** to give business to, nor wield his influence in favor of his fellow members. He is **expected** to do so whenever possible."


