

Seinfeld music creator and Louisvillian Jonathan Wolff shares 'behind the curtain' stories of his remarkable Hollywood career, including yada yada of working with Jerry Seinfeld and Larry David. January 29, 2015 Rotary Meeting

This week's meeting hosted Mayor Greg Fischer for his annual "State of the City" address. The meeting was located at the new Southwest Regional Library in Valley Station. Dr. Lynn Ogden led the invocation with John Hampton our Treasurer, following up with the Pledge and 4-Way Test. Soloist Pat Mathison, sang an inspiring rendition of our national anthem.

President Kevin introduced several groups of guests including David Tandy, the new Metro Council President and David Yates. Many were asked to stand as they were acknowledged for throughout the city. President Kevin went on to talk of the work of Rotary and Rotary International and offered anyone interested to check out membership at the 'What is Rotary?' table. He then introduced our Mayor and shared how they had met on a GLI, GLIDE trip to Indianapolis in 2009.

The Mayor began his address with the focus of Unprecedented Investment

in our community. This comes in the form of dollars, time and energy. Monetary investments have been in the form of building the Southwest Regional Library, with one to come soon in Okolona; investment in the hotels and infrastructure in downtown; such as the bridges, grocery stores and the Zerobus. There will be a Y at 18th and Broadway, Food Port in Russell, HUD Grant for Beecher Terrace and a Do Over for Dixie.

As important is the investment of time and energy. The Library represents an investment in people, as a place to learn and to find resources to improve through learning. The Mayor spoke about his Lifetime Learning Initiative and introduced his Cradle to Career Program. It is one framework to embrace the joy of learning and build a skilled workforce. Our world now requires college or some type of certification to earn above poverty levels. Children cannot start the journey behind either. His program addresses these issues on a four-pillar platform; Ready To Learn, K-12 Success, Post-Secondary Success and 21st Century Workforce and Talent.

The Mayor spoke as to why people choose Louisville to live and how it relates to this investment. The LIFT (Local Investment For Transformation) tax is an option for raising the capital per project and only for the term of that project. But as business owners



we can raise the skill level and education of our citizens through supporting Summerworks Program and Mentoring at schools. SummerWorks has students intern in the summer at participating businesses to gain true work experience and a sense of hope for their future. Our meeting wrapped up with a question/ answer period, and a thank you to the Mayor for his time and commitment.




