
What conference is the University of Louisville in this season anyway?

It's time for college football season, and 2013 has the feel of a special season. Every-

body has questions -- and Rick Bozich and Eric Crawford of WDRB will answer those questions and more.

Fourteen months after station manager Bill Lamb and news director Barry Fulmer boldly recruited them from the world of print journalism, Bozich and Crawford will explain why WDRB has been the perfect fit in the changing world of media and how the station and its surging website is covering the local sports scene.

Crawford will also talk about "The One-Day Contract," the book that he authored with Louisville basketball coach Rick Pitino, which will be published in October. Bozich has covered 32 of the last 33 NCAA Final Fours and is always eager to give his take on college basketball.





### July 25, 2013 Rotary Meeting

President Randy called the meeting to order followed by Brad Hume offering the invocation of 'Your Word, Our Service.' The pledge of allegiance was led by Alex Novak. Barbara Collins introduced Maggie Smith from the University of Kentucky who sang Faites-lui mes aveux from the "FAUST" opera by Gounod. She was accompanied by Elizabeth Huling. Downtown Rotary welcomed a fellow Rotarian from Osaka South (Japan) Rotary Club. We also had introductions of 24 visitors. Birthday celebrants were announced by Carol Nord.

Our very special guest, Governor Steve Beshear, took the podium to a standing ovation by Rotary. The Governor immediately remarked, *'I'm going to join Rotary!'* In his five and a half years in office, Governor Beshear has taken on three main goals. First, to restore the people's faith in state government. Second, to bring the State out of the global economic recession. Third, to invest in the core infrastructure of the state, that being its people. That is to say, the intellectual infrastructure of Kentucky. Addressing each of these goals individually, the Governor made the following comments.

Goal 1—During his tenure, the budget has been reduced 13 times, and the state has the smallest government workforce in 20 years.

Goal 2—The unemployment rate has dropped for two straight years. Exports are growing and the Kentucky auto industry is the third largest in the nation. When talking with CEOs of companies considering locating in Kentucky, the top need is always the same—to have access to a quality, educated, healthy workforce. Governor Beshear said his vision for Kentucky is that every child in the state has the opportunity to be successful. To that end, the Governor reported that we are on the leading edge of education reform. As evidence of that, the graduation rate in 2000 was 63.7% but climbed to 77.2% in 2010. That was one of the largest improvements in the nation.


Goal 3—Improving the health of Kentucky residents is a necessity as our residents rank at or near the bottom of almost every



major health statistic. Governor Beshear established the Kentucky Health Exchange as a result of the Affordable Health Care Act. The Exchange is a website where residents can shop for health insurance offered by various companies.

The final business of the day was the graduation presentation of Rotary Leadership Fellow Viji Sundar (pictured at left in blue dress). Addressing the audience, Viji commented, "Where else could I belong and sit at the head table with the Governor of Kentucky?" Another interesting statement was Viji saying that she used to be a 'gogetter' but Rotary turned her into a 'go-giver.' Now that's the spirit!


