Dr. Ted Smith was appointed by Mayor Greg Fischer as the Director of the newly-formed Office of Economic Growth and Innovation in January 2012. This department seeks to grow our economy through a wide range of means including flexible loan programs, advanced planning activities as well as strategic work in globalization and sustainability.

As of July, 2011, Dr. Smith was the city's first Director of Innovation and was tasked with both internal government agency innovation support as well as citizen engagement. Prior to joining city government, he was appointed Senior Advisor on Innovation in Health Information Technology in the Office of the National Coordinator (ONC) of Health IT in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. In that role, he led several initiatives focused on encouraging innovation in health IT and public private partnerships. Dr. Smith is a successful online media entrepreneur. His most recent company provided news about the treatment of chronic disease.

Dr. Smith holds a bachelor of science in Neuroscience from Allegheny College and a M.A. and Ph.D. in Cognitive Neuroscience from Miami University (OH). He completed his post-doctoral studies at MIT in space biomedicine and was a Co-Investigator for the Neurolab space shuttle mission.

Rotary Meeting - July 5, 2012

President Stuart Alexander rang the bell promptly at 12:15 and called his first meeting as Club President, and the club's first meeting of our 100th year, to order. Brad Hume offered the invocation, a reading of the traditional "Prayer of an Unknown Confederate Soldier." We observed a moment of silence in memory of longtime Rotarian and Paul Harris Fellow, Malcolm Fentress, who passed away June 28. Barbara Collins led the Pledge of Allegiance and introduced our guest vocalist, Gregory Emanuel Rahming and accompanist Dr. Jim Rightmyer. Our guests offered a truly outstanding rendition of The Star Spangled Banner and then led the club in singing God Bless America.

President Stuart invited guests and visiting Rotarians to stand as a group to be recognized and Alice Bridges hosted the birthday table with special recognition going to Bremer Ehrler on the occasion of his 98th birthday.

President Stuart congratulated Ingrid Hernandez on the recent Courier-Journal article featuring her work at InGrid Design and her community involvement. Congratulations were also extended to Marta Miranda, President/CEO of Center for Women & Families, for being selected to the Leadership Louisville Class of

2013. Past President "Stet" Stetten called upon the membership to purchase their tickets and attend the upcoming Centennial Event at the Ice House.

President Stuart then introduced our guest speaker, Senator Mitch McConnell. President Stuart presented Senator McConnell with a Rotary Promise Scholarship Certificate in appreciation for his attendance. Senator McConnell then presented the club with a framed copy of the Congressional Record in which the Club's 100th Anniversary was recognized.

Senator McConnell shared his concern about the future of the country, referring primarily to the current deficit spending and accumulating national debt. The Senator recounted recent actions, including a \$1 trillion stimulus bill, takeover of the American healthcare, nationalization of the student loan program, and growth in the number of public employees and regulation. Much of the discussion centered on the healthcare legislation and his concern that it would have a negative impact on the 83% of US citizens who currently have coverage. His preference is to help the remaining 17% in a more direct way. He summarized by saying the country is clearly at a crossroads and that the fall election is an extraordinarily important one.

Dan Hartlage then offered several questions submitted by members and the meeting adjourned at 1:13. - Alan Singleton

announce that a Strategic Planning Committee has been formed. Dennis Dolan, Ken Middleton, Karen Dahlem and Kevin Connelly have started involving members in the development of a 3-5 year plan, effective July 1, 2012.

Another vital element of our daily operation is the Constitution that critically needed updating to reflect the changes in Rotary International's Constitution. Thanks to the efforts of David Ratterman, and the Research & Development Committee, this year-long effort to adopt a new Constitution and structuring our Bylaws to comply and fulfill the needs of the Club has taken place. Continuation of the work needed will be carried out in the future as directed by the Strategic Plan. These changes will take place effective July 1, 2012.

Another year-long project was accomplished by Kevin Wardell and his Membership Orientation Task Force Committee (sub-committee of the former Yearling & Information Committee). His committee's great efforts revised the plan and put it into an instructional course format with a manual. The new Rotarian will be better informed, and the process will be smoother and more efficient, and far less time consuming. This new process started in June and will be in "full swing" in July of 2012.


