Mary Gwen Wheeler is the Executive Director of 55,000 Degrees, a multi-sector public-private partnership dedicated to increasing education attainment in the Louisville region. Previously, she served as the layor's Sr. Advisor for Education and Youth for Louisville Metro Government, leading policy development and implementation of education and youth initiatives. In Jerry Abramson's first term as Metrolayor, she served as Secretary of the Cabinet for Health and Family Services. Ms. Wheeler has served as a member of the Kentucky Board of Education since 2010, after being appointed by Governor Steve Beshear.

With a B.A. in American Studies and a Masters in

Public and Private Management from Yale University, Ms. Wheeler also has experience in family literacy, job training, non-profit management, strategic planning, teaching and international development. This included 10 years with the National Center for Family Literacy as a project manager and vice president of planning and development.

55,000 Degrees is at the midpoint of our ambitious, 10-year endeavor to create a workforce where half of all working-age adults hold college degrees. We are halfway to 2020, but not halfway to our goal.

# July 9, 2015 Rotary Meeting Recap

The Rotary Club of Louisville meeting of July 9, 2015 was called to order by Presider President Greg Braun. The invocation was provided by Rene Brown. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mark Kull who also led the Club's members in recitation of the Rotary Four Way Test. Various guests were introduced. Ed Jerdonek introduced the celebrants at the birthday.

President Greg made several announcements. First, next week's meeting will be held in the Grand Ballroom



located on the 10<sup>th</sup> floor of The Seelbach Hilton Hotel (this temporary change was made necessary due to Forecastle Music Festival which will take up almost all parking in and around the Galt House). Our speaker next week will be Mary Gwen Wheeler, Executive Director of 55,000 Degrees.

Keith Knapp then provided details on the upcoming Aging Forum, which will be held on July 3<sup>th</sup>. This event will be held in the Azalea Room on the second floor of The Galt House (West Tower).

President Greg then gave some "shout-outs" to the following Club members: Skip Miller (Executive Director of the Louisville Regional Airport Authority who was mentioned in an article in *Business First*); Ben Richmond (President of the Louisville Urban League) and Sam Watkins, Jr. (President/CEO of the Louisville Central Community Centers), both of whom were mentioned in an article in *Business First* about re-development in West Louisville; Susan Zepeda (President/CEO of Foundation for a Healthy Kentucky, who was mentioned in a *Business First* article about the Affordable Care Act, health care innovation and Kentucky's challenges and solutions). President Greg also recognized Christen Boone (President/CEO of Fund for the Arts) for her leadership in raising \$8.6 million during the Fund's annual fundraising drive.

President Greg congratulated Club member Carl Thomas for becoming the first member to take advantage of the Club's new automated recurring billing service and encouraged everyone else to take full advantage of this new service.



John Hampton then introduced the following new Club mem-bers: Jan Gray-son (CEO, JMG & Associates); Barry Allen (Exec Director, The Gheens Foundation); Jackie Ford (CEO, Girl Scouts of Kentuckiana); Mark Kull (Sole Proprietor, Northwestern Mutual Life); and, Irv Maze (Judge, Kentucky

Court of Appeals). Welcome, new members!

Past President Henry Heuser, Jr. introduced our guest speaker. David Phemister is the State Director of the Nature Conservancy and is Kentucky's link to international organization – the largest conservancy organization which counts more than one million members in 35 countries. The Nature Conservancy was founded in 1951 and its primary focus is to develop and support programs which conserve and protect lands and water.

David thanked Rotary for its community service and recognized Henry Heuser, Jr.'s leadership role in supporting the restoration of Louisville's tree canopy. David has been with the Conservancy for 13 years and has served as Kentucky's State Director for 11 months.

Unlike other groups, the Conservancy is non-confrontational, and operates on a science-based, non-partisan basis. Its main thrusts are to "protect, transform and inspire." David noted the historic migration which is occurring around the world of people from rural to urban areas (it is estimated that 70% of the world's population will live in cities in the future, consuming 80% of the world's natural resources). As much as \$5 trillion will be needed in order to invest in infrastructure to support/protect resources to serve urban areas.

David also spoke about Louisville's declining tree canopy. Louisville is losing as many as 56,000 trees each year due to natural and man-made issues. Today only 37% of the city is covered by the tree canopy, which has resulted in a very high heat island – one

of the highest such ratings in the U.S. The Conservancy's goal is to develop a canopy which covers 45% of the city by 2052. Trees Louisville is actively working with the Conservancy on this issue.

There being no further business the meeting was then adjourned.  $\$ - Respectfully submitted by: Luke B. Schmidt
