Michael Gritton has served as the Executive Director of KentuckianaWorks, the region's Workforce Develop-ment Board, for 13 years. Leveraging federal, state and local government dollars as well as private philanthropic grants, KentuckianaWorks funds and oversees a

number of programs that build a stronger community one person at a time through the dignity of works. Gritton's tenure has been marked by innovations that create opportunities for individuals to improve their economic competitiveness. These include:

- A national award-winning summer jobs effort led by Mayor Greg Fischer (the Mayor's SummerWorks Program) that helped over 2,500 16-21 year olds find work in the Louisville region in 2015;
- A cutting-edge effort to train and place hundreds of new software coders called Code Louisville that was celebrated in April 2015 in a visit from President Barack Obama;
- A national award-winning regional partnership (WIRED65) with three other Workforce Development Boards that spans a 26-county, 2-state region and is leading the region's efforts to provide more industry partnerships and more sector-driven training initiatives; and <u>More Here</u>



before each meeting. The Rotary Leader starts the meeting with an opening activity and comments. Students are assigned tables by class. Mentors lead the discussion and help a small group of students (8-10) with skills: communication, goal setting, decision making, teamwork, respect, interview preparation, time management, confidence building, college preparation, planning, and leadership based upon the lesson plan (provided). We need ten more Rotarians who want to help promote education and the Rotary Promise Scholarship. No mentoring experience required.

Rotary Promise Scholarship info & update: In honor of the Centennial year of The Rotary Club of Louisville (2011), the Rotary established a permanent endowment (over \$1M) that will award scholarships to deserving graduates from Western and Iroquois high schools in the Jefferson County Public School system. Since the fall of 2012, 32 members of the class of 2016 qualify for our scholarship by attaining a GPA of 2.5 or higher, better than 90% attendance and no major disciplinary issues: Juniors - 42, Sophomores - 53, and Freshman - 61. We are mentoring over 170 students!

Rotary Fund? Rotary Foundation? What's the difference?

A Guide for the Perplexed by Susan Zepeda, Ph.D.

Why are there two lines on your quarterly invoice, requesting support for both the Rotary Fund and the Rotary Foundation?

The Rotary Fund of Louisville (501C3) aka 'Rotary Fund' was established by our Club, in 1951. Money the Club raises for its service projects is held in this Fund, and a portion of it is distributed each year, to support projects endorsed by our Club's Committees, as well as annual recognition events like Unsung Heroes. Some of the dollars you invest in the Rotary Fund are sent to Rotary International to meet our Club's annual obligation to support Polio Plus, without holding a special fundraiser or member solicitation. Thanks to worldwide Rotary support, joined with the World Health Organization, the Gates Foundation and many national governments, wild polio virus is nearly wiped out worldwide—today, only two countries are not polio-free. Rotary Fund resources also become our Club's contribution to District and Global service projects our members undertake. More about this later.

The Rotary Foundation was created by Rotary International (RI). In 1917, Rotary International President Arch C. Klumph proposed an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." His vision became The Rotary Foundation. Each Rotarian is asked to provide \$100 per year toward this work, to be considered a "Sustaining Member." When the sum of your contributions to The Rotary Foundation reaches \$1000, you are recognized by the Club as a "Paul Harris Fellow." When your commitment is at the level of \$1000 per year (for example, by giving \$84 per month through Rotary Direct) you are welcome to join the Paul Harris Society. More Here
