Unsung Heroes

High School Seniors Recognition Emcee: Kevin Smith March 21, 2016

Rotary's motto is "Service Above Self", and the Unsung Hero Recognition Program encourages youth to excel in this area while working behind the scenes and seldom, if ever, stepping into the limelight. Rotary will honor and publicly recognize high school seniors from 48 public, private and parochial schools in Jefferson County. These students will receive \$250 and a certificate of achievement, as well as vouchers for art/civic centers and restaurants (i.e., Actors Theatre, Louisville Orchestra, Louisville Ballet, Louisville Zoo, Louisville Science Center, Louisville Bats Baseball, Kentucky Derby Museum, Texas Roadhouse and Skyline Chili). All Unsung Hero recipients and finalists who are pursuing a post-secondary education in Jefferson County will be eligible to apply for Rotary scholarships from Bellarmine, Spalding, UofL, Sullivan and JCTC. Scholarships range from \$1,000 to \$16,000 for a total of \$42,000.

The Unsung Heroes Project Chair is Craig Scherman. Thursday's program emcee is Kevin Smith, and other Rotarians involved are: Ray Strothman, accounting services; Bob Niblock, judging; Arne Judd, scholarships; and the Rotary Youth-Education Committee. Since its beginning 16 years ago, over \$750,000 has been given away by Metro Louisville Rotary Club Charities, Inc., which includes The Rotary Club of Louisville and other Rotary clubs in the area. Kosair Charities is also a significant financial partner in this initiative. According to school administrators, the Unsung Hero Recognition Program generates many positive results to their school and community because it stresses the importance of student volunteerism. Our involvement enables Rotary to be known as an organization that cares about the future of youth in our community, and that we are investing in the next generation of decision makers.

Rotary Promise Scholarship info & update: In honor of the Centennial year of The Rotary Club of Louisville (2011), the Rotary established a permanent endowment (over \$1M) that will award scholarships to deserving graduates from Western and Iroquois high schools in the Jefferson County Public School system. Since the fall of 2012, 32 members of the class of 2016 qualify for our scholarship by attaining a GPA of 2.5 or higher, better than 90% attendance and no major disciplinary issues: Juniors - 42, Sophomores - 53, and Freshman - 61. We are mentoring over 170 students!

Rotary Fund? Rotary Foundation? What's the difference? A Guide for the Perplexed by Susan Zepeda, Ph.D.

Why are there two lines on your quarterly invoice, requesting support for both the Rotary Fund and the Rotary Foundation?

The Rotary Fund of Louisville (501C3) aka 'Rotary Fund' was established by our Club, in 1951. Money the Club raises for its service projects is held in this Fund, and a portion of it is distributed each year, to support projects endorsed by our Club's Committees, as well as annual recognition events like Unsung Heroes. Some of the dollars you invest in the Rotary Fund are sent to Rotary International to meet our Club's annual obligation to support Polio Plus, without holding a special fundraiser or member solicitation. Thanks to worldwide Rotary support, joined with the World Health Organization, the Gates Foundation and many national governments, wild polio virus is nearly wiped out worldwide—today, only two countries are not polio-free. Rotary Fund resources also become our Club's contribution to District and Global service projects our members undertake. More about this later.

The Rotary Foundation was created by Rotary International (RI). In 1917, Rotary International President Arch C. Klumph proposed an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." His vision became The Rotary Foundation. Each Rotarian is asked to provide \$100 per year toward this work, to be considered a "Sustaining Member." When the sum of your contributions to The Rotary Foundation reaches \$1000, you are recognized by the Club as a "Paul Harris Fellow." When your commitment is at the level of \$1000 per year (for example, by giving \$84 per month through Rotary Direct) you are welcome to join the Paul Harris Society. More Here
