## SPEED ART MUSEUM

2035 South Third Street March 10, 2016

Closed during a three-year extensive expansion, Rotarians and guests on the RSVP list will tour the Speed Art Museum on March 10, two days before officially re-opening to the public.

BUS RIDERS: Board the TARC at the Galt House before 11:15 am. After the tour, the bus will leave The Speed no later than 1:15 pm.

DRIVERS: The parking garage is adjacent to The Speed on South Third Street. You'll receive stickers for free parking when you arrive.

Founded in 1925 by Hattie Bishop Speed as a memorial to her husband, James Breckinridge Speed, a prominent Louisville businessman and philanthropist, the Speed Art Museum is Kentucky's oldest and largest art museum. From its modest beginnings in 1925, the museum has continued to expand its building and enrich its collection. Extending the legacy of its founder, the museum's grand reopening will turn a new light on the Speed's wide-ranging collections. With freshly renovated galleries and new, expansive spaces devoted to contemporary art and the art of Kentucky, visitors will have the opportunity to see familiar favorites in novel ways and new acquisitions in new spaces. Supplemented by important loans, the extensive collection highlights more than 6,000 years of human creativity.

Part of the \$56 million expansion of the new Speed Art Museum, and one of the newest attractions, is the 142-seat Cinema, equipped with state-of-the-art technology, including 16mm, 35mm and DCI-compliant 4K digital projection systems. A diverse mix of American independent and international films will be screened twice daily, Friday through Sunday, with event rental and high-end video conferencing also available.
