

John began his Zoo career at the Palm Beach Zoo after graduating from Penn State University in 1978. He then worked as a supervisor at the Oklahoma City Zoo for several years before coming to Louisville in 1985 to design and build the HerpAquarium and Curate the Ectotherm department. After managing more than \$30 million in Zoo expansion, John was named Director of the Louisville Zoo in 2004. As Director, John led the successful design and accomplishment of the \$26 million Glacier Run Capital Campaign that funded exhibit openings from 2006 to 2013, growing the Zoo's business through the recession with more 900,000 guests in 2012. That same year Glacier Run earned the highest award of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums: Exhibit of the Year. The Louisville Zoo was likewise awarded the Association's 2013 Significant Achievement Award for Excellence in Education, earned as a result of the *"School at the Zoo"* program.

Attractions Council and Indiana University Southeast. He is very active in the Association of Zoos and Aquariums, having served on the Ethics Board, the Accreditation Commission as well as having recently completed his term on the AZA Board of Directors.

John has been a Rotarian since 2004 and he is passionate about pursuing the Zoo's Mission in serving our community. He believes that it is imperative for the Zoo to engage people through amazing experiences with animal ambassadors as a way to impart our roles in advocacy for living in better balance with our planet's ecosystem. The actions we take impact not only global environmental health but also the health of ourselves, our children and the animals who share the planet with us.





April 30, 2015 Rotary Meeting

The annual 'Rotary Derby Meeting' began appropriately with a trumpeted 'Call to Post' played by Josh Lewis, General Manager of Alpha Productions. René Brown provided a moving invocation and Past President Stuart Alexander led the pledge and Rotary 4-Way Test. Our talented Rotary Rockin Band entertained with 'Eight More Miles to Louisville', led by vocals from mandolin player Mark Grundy. Many special guests were introduced, with David Ratterman who brought 20+ guests (among them were UK President Dr. Eli Capilouto and Dr. Mary Lynne Capilouto, Steve and Teresa Bachman ... just to name a few). President Kevin announced next week's speaker, John Walczak, Louisville Zoo Director. John will bring several animals with him, but you'll need to come a little early to see them, since they won't be allowed in the dining room. Great photos from the Rotary Day at the Downs taken by Drs. Stetten and Hilgers were shown on the screens. Brooke Egan reminded all to register for the big May 12 FUNdraiser Event! Ken Grossman announced the 'F-R-E-E' Business Synergy event on May 21. Then Barbara Sexton Smith explained the annual Rotary Derby Game. We all agreed that Barbara brings



much fun and excitement to any announcement! (A total of \$207 was collected, so \$107 will be donated to the Rotary Fund of Louisville and the remaining \$100 will be awarded, along with the silver mint julep cup, to the winner at next week's meeting!)



Dr. Charles Oberst introduced our guest speaker John Asher, who has been our Derby week speaker for 18 years! John shared extensively about a horse named Regret, and the fact that 100 years ago in 1915, she was the first filly to win the Kentucky Derby. There had been much anticipation for this foal, having been bred by owner Harry Payne Whitney, by stallion Broomstick (the 1913-1915 leading sire inducted into the National Museum of Racing and Hall of Fame) and a great mare, Jersey Lightning. Whitney revealed his disappointment when the delivery did not produce a colt, and named the filly Regret. Little did he know that she would make history and win the Kentucky Derby by two lengths (see photo at left). Asher added that women were demonstrating for the right to vote during 1915, and that some horsemen thought a filly shouldn't be in the Derby because a filly just couldn't win. Only two other fillies have won the Kentucky Derby since (Genuine Risk in 1980 and Winning Colors in 1988). Regret went on to achieve nine victories in 11 starts of her career. Regret was the second filly to win American Horse

of the Year in the 20th Century, and she was inducted into the National Museum of Racing and Hall of Fame in 1957.

John talked about the Kentucky Oaks and that most race goers will be dressed in pink, in honor of the Oaks official flower, the stargazer lily, and also in honor of Bright Pink (a nonprofit organization that focuses on the prevention and early detection of breast and ovarian cancer) and Horses & Hope (a breast cancer initiative of the Office of the First Lady and the Kentucky Cancer Program). This will be John's 34th Kentucky Derby, and his winners have been sparse during the years, but this year he's going with the favorite on top, American Pharoah. John saw this horse work last weekend and watched him on the track, and believes AP is the horse that everyone thinks he is. John also likes Mubtaahij and believes he will take second place. Asher said that if American Pharoah gets tested a little more than he wants in the early part of the race, Mubtaahij just might win the race. John predicts that Dortmund, the other Bob Baffert horse, will come in third. He said that several other horses in the race run well if you're looking for a long shot but, if you're looking for a big price, Bolo is your horse. He's from California and has been running with the best of the horses. He also has a good grass pedigree. John loves 'grass pedigrees' on the main track at Churchill.
