Mr. DeLisle has been Executive Director of the Louisville Downtown Development Corporation since March 2009. He has worked on several projects in Louisville including Whiskey Row, South Fourth Street Retail Initiative, Bourbon Row on Main Street, Arena District Streetscape improvements, the ten year Downtown Strategic Plan, the annual State of the Downtown event, regulatory reforms, the Downtown Commercial Loan Fund and the Nucleus-NuLu Connectivity project.

Alan earned his Bachelor of Arts Degree in Communication/Journalism in 1982 with a concentration in print and Broadcast Journalism at St. John Fisher College, New York, and earned his Master's Degree in Political Science in 1985 with a concentration in State and Local government at the State University of New York. Mr. DeLisle is a Certified Economic Development Professional by the International Economic Development Council. He was selected as a New York State Senate Fellow from 1985-1986 and later became a Policy Analyst for the New York State Commission on Critical Transportation Choices and as Legislative Director to New York State Senator Anthony M. Masiello. Other positions in the City of Buffalo were: 1) Confidential Aide to the Mayor for Policy and Intergovernmental Affairs; 2) Commissioner of Community Development; and 3) President of Buffalo Economic Renaissance Corporation.

Mr. DeLisle has served on many economic development and community boards and has been a Rotarian for many years. Alan and his wife, Kim, have two daughters, Alexa and Alaina. DeLisle and his wife are currently in the process of starting a family foundation to assist individuals and families with traumatic brain injuries.

May 9, 2013 Rotary Meeting

Today's was a program when it was important to hear every word. Tracy Holladay began appropriately with an Invocation based on the significance of "Words." And everyone seemed to know the words to "I've Been working on the Railroad" which was sung after Bobbie Rafferty led us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Visitors were welcomed, including District Governor Don Dykman, and the meeting went immediately into the day's program — "The Annual Rotary Speech Competition" introduced by Stan Klausing.

Klausing began by reminding us that "A picture is worth a thousand words" and that "today's words by one of the three student finalists will be worth \$1,000." In all, 91 students had entered the competition, through 25 District Rotary Clubs. Then, one after the other, McKenzie Wilson, Sam Dugan, and Victoria Potter delivered well thought-out responses to the assigned theme "Peace Through Service.* All three were poised and articulate as they delivered their speeches, standing on the main floor just in front of the podium.

Quotable quotes, "It's time for compassionate action.", "Simple acts of kind-

ness bring about peace", "Peace is possible", "People will never know how far a little kindness will go" and "We need to give back to our community by being kind to others." Club business continued after the speeches, including the recognition of those with birthdays, and announcements of coming events. The rankings, by a panel of Rotarian judges, were reported and declared. District Governor Dykman presented \$500 to each of the runners up, Miss McKenzie Wilson and Mr. Sam Dugan, and the first place winner, Miss Victoria Potter, received \$1,000.
