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



Next Meeting: Thursday, May 21, 2015

The seventh president of Toyota Motor Manufacturing, Kentucky, Inc. since 2010, Wil James leads Toyota's largest automotive manufacturing plant in North America, while also championing quality initiatives for Toyota's fourteen North American manufacturing operations. Toyota's Kentucky plant manufactures the Camry, America's best-selling car, and was recently the new home of the first U.S. produced Lexus.

James was recently named one of the Top 100 Most Influential Blacks in Corporate America. While serving as Toyota's North American diversity champion, he led diversity and inclusion efforts for the company in plants across the U.S., Canada and Mexico, which directly employs more than 40,000 people.

In addition to ensuring that his company serves as an outstanding corporate and community citizen, James lends his personal talents in service to several civic and community organizations. He currently serves as

Chair-Elect of the Board of Directors for the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, is a board member of the Bluegrass Economic Advancement Movement and was most recently named as a board member of National Urban League.

A native of Norfolk, Virginia, James received his Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering Technology from Old Dominion University in 1978. Additionally, in 2013, James received an honorary doctorate of engineering from the University of Kentucky in recognition of his life's work, and his leadership with Toyota.

He and his wife, Michaelene, reside in Lexington, Kentucky, which places him close to his children and their families.

May 14, 2015 Rotary Meeting

The meeting was called to order by President Kevin Wardell. The invocation was provided by Muhammad Babar, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Glenn Price, and the Rotary Four Way Test was also recited. Various guests were introduced. Kristin Willard introduced the birth-day celebrants, and Lee Squires' retirement from Cave Hill Cemetery was recognized. President Kevin made several announcements and thanked members for their participation and attendance to make the May 12 FUNdraiser such a success! VP Julie Schmidt reminded members to submit 'Rotarian of the Year' nominations before the May 28 deadline. John Jennings announced the May 21 Business Synergy event which will be held at the new Eight-Up lounge. Treasurer John Hampton provided the Treasurer's Report, and also provided a few financial facts. He suggested that members can join others and authorize the office to keep their credit card info on file for automatic payment of membership dues each quarter. David Dunn introduced guest speakers Stephen Reily and Caroline Heine who presented information about the West Louisville Food-Port. This project is basically a food-centric economic and community development engine that will create jobs for West Louisville residents, enhance the built environment and green space of surrounding disinvested neighborhoods, while enabling existing small busi-



nesses to grow. In addition, it will increase farmers' income as they increase their market channels, enable new food businesses to take their first steps, and provide educational opportunities about food and agriculture. This is a rendering (at left) of the potential site at 3029 West Muhammad Ali Boulevard (located at the intersection of the Russell,

Shawnee and Portland neighborhoods). The plan is to transform the 24-acre brownfield into a seed-to-waste food chain where food is grown, harvested, processed, sold, eaten and even disposed into a bio-digester to be converted to methane gas and returned to the energy stream. This project represents a potential \$50 million+ investment in West Louisville that will bring 200 permanent jobs, of which nearly two-thirds are new, as well as 275 temporary construction jobs. All jobs will pay above minimum wage.

Among other statistics provided, Stephen reported that Louisville is rated #7 on Zagat's list of America's Next Hot Food Cities. A recent survey revealed that 72 percent of Louisvillians already buy local food. The survey also revealed that commercial buyers currently spend \$214 million on local foods, and would be willing to spend an additional \$139 million, for a total of \$353 million. Much of the food the commercial sectors purchase will be handled, transformed and resold in a variety of outlets, leveraging that \$353 million in local food purchases to contribute an estimated \$800 million to the local economy.

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
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
