Mark Slaughter, M.D., an internationally acclaimed expert in heart transplants and ventricular assist devices (VAD), is the director of the Heart Transplant and Mechanical Assist Device program at Jewish Hospital & St. Mary's HealthCare, as well as chief of the department of Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgery for the University of Louisville.

After receiving his medical degree from the Indiana University School of Medicine, Dr. Slaughter completed his general surgery residency at McGaw Medical Center of Northwestern University in Chicago, and his cardiovascular and thoracic surgery fellowship at the University of Minnesota Hospital and Clinic. He is certified by the American Board of Surgery and American Board of Thoracic Surgery. Prior to leaving Chicago's Advocate Christ Medical Center and the University of Illinois in 2008, Dr. Slaughter implanted over 250 ventricular assist devices and was a leader in destination therapy, or permanent use of the device for patients who aren't transplant eligible. His work has also focused on using the VAD as a bridge to transplant, as

well as for myocardial recovery and rescue surgeries.

Dr. Slaughter has published over 50 articles, has written a book, and chapters in multiple books. He serves on the board of directors for the American Society of Artificial Internal Organs (ASAIO), board of trustees for the International Society of Rotary Blood Pumps, the editorial board of ASAIO and is a journal reviewer for the Annals of Thoracic Surgery, Circulation and the Journal of Heart and Lung Transplantation. Dr. Slaughter currently serves as a consultant to the FDA Medical Device Review panel and a National Science Foundation SBIR/STTR grant reviewer. He has served two terms for the Health and Human Services Medicare Coverage Advisory committee.

In addition to being substantially active in clinical trials and manuscript contributions, Dr. Slaughter is committed to training future leaders in thoracic surgery. Since Dr. Slaughter's arrival, Jewish Hospital has become the second hospital in the nation (and first in Kentucky) to implant the Heart-Ware Ventricular Assist System as part of a national clinical trial. The implant procedure was performed by Dr. Slaughter, the principal investigator in the trial, and was completely successful. HeartWare's HVAD pump is the only full-output pump designed to be implanted in the chest, avoiding the abdominal surgery generally required to implant competing devices. Dr. Slaughter's overlying goal is to offer individuals with heart failure an alternative to heart transplantation, repairing hearts and helping them recover naturally, without the need of a transplant.

May 22, 2014 Rotary Meeting

The Rotary Club of Louisville convened on Thursday, May 22, 2014 at the African-American Heritage Center. The meeting was called to order by Club President Randy Coe. The invocation was given by Mark Hogg. Dorn Crawford presided over an impressive tribute to Memorial Day which started with a video containing excerpts from President Reagan's 1981 Inaugural Address. The tribute also included presenting of the colors by the Kentucky Air National Guard Color Guard based at Louisville International Airport, followed by the pledge of allegiance. Then soloist Pat Mathison sang the National Anthem a cappella, and bugler Skip Banister played the taps. Leo Smith introduced the birthday table, and the honorees who were present were honored with the singing of Happy Birthday. The Operations Manager of the Kentucky Center for African American Heritage, Rita Phillips, added her welcome to Club members, and invited attendees to consider using the facility for future events.



President Randy then introduced our guest speaker (and fellow Club member), Dr. Donna Hargens, Superintendent of Jefferson County Public Schools (JCPS). Although scheduled to speak on the success of the Rotary Promise Scholarship's partnership with JCPS, Dr. Hargens first commented on the audit which had been completed and released just the day before by Adam Edelen, Auditor of Public Accounts for the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Dr. Hargens noted that the JCPS Board of Education had specifically requested the audit of the Department's organizational structure and had already started to implement some of the recommendations contained in the audit. Dr. Hargens stated that "every data point contained in the audit is a heartbeat."

Dr. Hargens concluded her remarks by focusing on the Rotary Promise Scholarship partnership. Rotary has now partnered with two high schools – Western and Iroquois – to provide financial assistance to each student who upon graduation has met certain goals, including finishing with a 2.5 GPA, 90% attendance record, and no suspensions. At present, 40 Western and 92 Iroquois students are on track to earn a scholarship which will provide up to 60 credit hours over the first two years at Jefferson Community & Technical College and up to \$10,000 in additional scholarship money at the University of Louisville. Dr. Hargens recognized support for the program from businesses such as Kosair Charities, Norton Healthcare, UPS, Texas Roadhouse and Buckheads, along with Club members who are serving as mentors to students.

There being no further business, the meeting concluded with the recitation of the Rotary Four-Way Test. — Luke B. Schmidt
