


Great Day for a Rotary Picnic!

"Forever Chemicals" Film Screening & Panel Discussion

Your Rotary Club helped support an important event this past Sunday at the Speed Cinema focused on the "forever chemicals" that cause cancer. We viewed the documentary *Burned: Protecting the Protectors*, presented by the Kentucky Division of the UNA-USA, which is involved in anti-human trafficking and health issues.



For years, firefighters around the country have fought fires in their work "gear", which was water and fire repellent. They did not realize that the repellents used in the manufacture of these suits were man-made chemicals (PFAs) which never degrade and which enter our bodies through our skin and cause cancer. 3M and DuPont manufacture these chemicals and knew they caused cancer in lab animals. Yet the EPA and these manufacturers kept making the chemicals and using them in all kinds of "wonderful" products, such as Teflon frying pans. Firefighters have suffered more deaths from body cancers, such as testicular cancer, rectal cancer and other cancers in the lower torso or the abdomen, than they have from inhalation of toxic fumes from fires. Firefighter organizations have lobbied for protective suits made of other materials and have only recently made any progress in this fight.

The film, directed by Elijah Yetter-Bowman and produced by Mark Ruffalo, was attended by many government officials as well as firefighter officials, including new chief Brian O'Neill of the Louisville Fire Department, who spoke passionately about this issue and mentioned three firemen who died of these cancers in the past year. The panel discussion that followed the screening, which included the film director, was very informative.


One More Host Needed for Our Rotary Friendship Exchange

Leading the Brooks Grain Family Legacy

Built on reputation and relationships, Brooks Grain has provided high-quality grain services for the distilling industry since 2007. Founded by Erica Fields, the company was named in honor of her father, Brooks Fields, who developed a reputation as a high-quality grain supplier to distilleries dating back to the early 1960s. Throughout most of his career, he worked for Bundick Grain, a specialty grain marketing firm that supplied malting barley to the brewing and distilling industries.

Barley was the company's bread and butter; Brooks also supplied rye and corn to various distillers, growing the business over time. He eventually became the premier supplier of high-quality rye to the U.S. distilling industry as well as becoming one of the major suppliers of corn to the Canadian distilling industry.

Erica grew up immersed in the grain world and began to learn the business alongside her father at Bundick Grain in 1978. By the time her father retired, Erica was an experienced international grain merchant, supplying the distilling industry and ensuring the availability of high-quality rye to her customers.

Today, the family grain legacy continues with the business' second and third generations: wives Erica and Patience Fields, and the couple's nephew, Nick Nossan. The company supplies almost all of the major distilleries in Kentucky and surrounding areas in the south.

Married now for ten years, Erica and Patience Fields moved to Louisville in 2017 to be closer to their customers and continue to grow the business. In the next few pages, the couple shares stories from their childhood, falling in love with one another, their theatrical adventures, and the ongoing legacy of the Brooks Grain family business.

Patience

Raised and raised by her adoptive parents in Omaha, Nebraska, Patience grew up in a somewhat strict household with her adopted sister, Cindy, and her parents' biological son, David. In her household, she was the youngest of the three. Childhood was somewhat stifling, as Patience always knew she wanted to pursue theater, which was not encouraged. Her parents recognized her intelligence, and wanted to keep her on a more educational path; the theater was a distraction from this philosophy. Plus, she was growing up in the far suburbs of Omaha, which was incredibly isolated from the rest of the city, or any level of diversity.

However, Patience knew what was deep within her soul. There were times when she was able to get a taste of life outside the area in which she felt confined. In second grade, she attended Lothrop, and in ninth, Horace Mann, as part of bussing due to integration efforts.

"There was only one black child in my neighborhood grade school, so when I went downtown, it was the first time being with many children that were not white suburbanites," said Patience. "It truly shaped me."

Here, she was able to interact and meet others who had various interests and backgrounds. The city of Omaha was (and, according to Patience, still is in many ways) fairly segregated. She snuck out to the school dance in 7th grade, where her father found her and pulled her out by her ear. In eleventh and twelfth grade, she was able to take a photography class in downtown Omaha, a project that took three hours a day at the Career Center, during school hours. Her parents accepted it mainly because it was a program she earned her way into, and they respected her academic accomplishments.

As soon as she was able, she pursued her love of theater, landing her first role at age 18 during her senior year of high school at the Omaha Magic Theatre.

"I lied to my parents and told them I was babysitting. I wasn't allowed to have a normal high school experience, I wasn't allowed to go to parties and school events, but I had a car and I drove myself to school. I wasn't allowed to have a life," she said.

"The Magic Theatre is an extremely unique LGBTQ+queer-gaile theater that was run by famous queer playwright, Megan Terry," said Patience.
