Her presentation was **#100 days of service ~ Mexico, Belize, Costa Rica, Panama, and** Colombia




Tanya's partner partner was the District 5040 Governor 2020-2021 and, unfortunately, passed away before the end of his DG year after a 5-year battle with cancer. Her daughter, Georgia, went on exchange to Denmark 18 months later, which led Tanya to embark on her adventure. She used the family of Rotary to see her through on a backpack journey. She called on Rotary clubs in Central America. She did the fundraising on her own, but benefited with her Rotary club's name to assist with fundraising.

Tanya started with her mother in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico as she had musical instruments to donate there. Second, she went to Colima and volunteered on a project entitled Project Amigo. In Puebla she spent Christmas painting a community

center before her mom returned home. In Merida, she painted a home for folks that were going through cancer treatments and other treatments. In Belize, Tanya went to the Belize Central Prison. It was a Rotary run prison and she said well-run. She worked in the women section and trained 10 women to be painters. Most women were in the prison due to immigration issues. Tanya painted a Venezuelan Refugee camp in San Jose, Costa Rica. And a police station in Jaco. Tanya was able to get tourists and local Rotarians to help her paint. In Panama she painted garbage cans in Boquete. She also worked in a thrift store to benefit kids with disabilities.

She's going to Colombia again this year under the name, Canada to Colombia for the Kids, bringing along her daughter and niece, adding more locations. In Cartegena she painted the second floor of a school and will paint the first floor this year and build a shelter over the outdoor courtyard. Tanya is also going to Santa Marta and bringing musical instruments to rebuild their marching band in addition to painting various projects. Tanya went to Medellin and painted an orphanage called the Love Garden Foundation. This year they will decorate and furnish the rooms on the 3rd floor currently being built. In Bogota, she was involved with the Sun of the Andes Foundation, which is a facility for families battling cancer. This year the trio will work to create a living plant wall, which she says she has never done and paint the whole facility. Cali will be the last location and includes a home that is for kids going through cancer treatment. This next summer she is going with the help of her daughter, Georgia, and niece, Hana, after their high school graduation. Tanya's passion for Rotary was inspirational.
