QUINCY SQUARE UPDATE



City employee **Katie Ketterer** reported on the progress of the Quincy Square project on 4th Street that we are planning to support with a donation. It is out to bid, with construction expected to begin this summer and is expected to be completed by the end of the year or early next year. She said two art committees had selected artworkâ€" a large mural of Quincy Jones on the side of the parking garage at 4th and Washington

and large scale bronze sculpture of him as well. Quincy Jones is an accomplished American songwriter and record producer who came to Bremerton in 1940 and spent some of his growing up years here. Quincy Square seeks to convert a block of Fourth Street from Pacific Avenue to Washington Avenue into an urban arts and performing center.

PROGRAM: Music Discovery Center

Steve Rice introduced the program on the 4½-year-old Music Discovery Center (MDC), a countywide nonprofit organization that seeks to increase access to music education, mentorship and performance for area youth, especially underserved youth. It is goals

are:

- 1. To develop and host the largest musical festival on this side of Puget Sound;
- 2. To build a comprehensive mentoring and teaching network in the area;
- 3. To host the largest continuing public open mic jam sessions in the area;
- 4. To eventually have their own musical studio in the Quincy Square development.



Assisting Steve in his presentation were MDC board members **Harriette Bryant** and Jon Green, pictured above. Harriette explained MDCâ€[™]s roots and that the organization is an outgrowth of the City of Bremertonâ€[™]s soon-to-be-constructed Quincy Square project. Harriette and the city had solicited support from Black community leaders for the Quincy Square project and contacted Quincy Jones, who enthusiastically supported the project. She said the city is working with Rice Fergus Miller Architects to design and complete the construction oversight of the project. Jon Green talked about MDCâ€^{™s} Music in a Box program to gather donated musical instruments for local youth. He also told about the Make Music Day Festival that will take place June 22 from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. in Rotary Evergreen Park, featuring amateur as well as professional musicians.

Steve asked the question "Why is Music Important?†He said that when he and Terri were raising their kids, they saw what an impact music made and continues to make in their lives.
