PROGRAM



The speaker was Leadership Kitsap Executive Director **Carly Meurs.** She grew up in Manchester and graduated from South Kitsap High School as well as Eastern Washington and Salem International University. A Leadership Kitsap graduate in 2017, Caryl was hired as LK Program Director and took over as Executive Director from Kitsap County Commissioner **Katie Walters.**

Doug Berger introduced Carly; he was one of the

community leaders who founded Leadership Kitsap in 1996. All the Chambers of Commerce in the county participated and our Bremerton Rotary Club has supported the program over the years. Each year about 30 persons are selected for the program, designed to give potential community leaders a broader picture of Kitsap County. They meet once a month for 10 months. Participants are divided into smaller groups who tackle "signature programs†to benefit the community.

This year there are five groups supporting signature programs. These projects are as follows:

- 1. Establishing a basketball tournament for teenage youth throughout the county;
- Working with the Suquamish Tribal Wellness Center to disseminate Naloxene boxes; Naloxone is a life-saving drug that can prevent opioid deaths;
- Creating the framework for a quarterly cooking class, seasonally crafted and taught by local chefs, in cooperation with the Kitsap Community Food & Co-Op;
- **4.** Assisting the Kitsap History Museum in creating building markers for 12 historic sites in downtown;
- Relaunch of the Kitsap County Parks Passport Program that encourages youngsters to visit all of the countyâ€[™]s parks.
