A little background for our newer members: Unlike most clubs, which hold Installation Dinners for their new slate of officers, we traditionally have held a Kickout Dinner in which the outgoing president is booted from office with a kind of roast. A few years back, a kinder but gentler version of this was crafted, which was called an End of the Year Celebration, where various awards were handed out. But the popularity of the kickout theme remains, as President Geoff rediscovered last Thursday night at Evergreen Pizza and a hybrid event followed.

Tom heads up our clubâ \in TMs youth exchange program locally and John is on the District 5020 Youth Exchange Committee. He is the country contact for Northern Europe and Scandinavia.



The George M.H. Dibblee Rotarian of the Year Award, chosen by the outgoing president Geoff, went to Carrie Rivers, who goes above and beyond the call of duty in so many ways. For instance, she organizes our wine booth at the Blackberry Festival and is there throughout the event. (George Dibblee, pronounced Dibbel was the oldest surviving charter member of our club from 1941 and had 53 years of perfect attendance upon his death.)

PROGRAM



Sunny Saunders, whom we know as our Blackberry Festival Manager, was our speaker. In addition to the Blackberry Festival, Sunny's company, Sunny Jack Events, founded in 2017, produces the following local events:

• **The Kitsap Wedding Expo,** the largest bridal show in West Sound, Feb. 3, 2024, Kitsap Pavilion

• **Taste of Kitsap,** featuring a beer garden, entertainment and food, Aug. 2-3, 2024, Bremerton Boardwalk

• **Bremerton Bridge Blast,** the largest "bridge†fireworks show in the Northwest, from the Manette Bridge, June 29-30, 2024, Bremerton Boardwalk and Evergreen Rotary Park.

• **Bremerton Boardwalk Night Market**, featuring makers, music and food and a beer garden, Fridays May 3, June 7, July 5 and October 4, 2024, Bremerton Boardwalk.

Sunny also told us about herself. She is a third generation Bremertonian and a graduate of Bremerton High School, Olympic College and Chapman University. She got her start in event planning 20 years ago when the local Soroptimist Club asked her to put on a crafts fair. She subsequently became manager of the Kitsap Fair & Rodeo and is now full owner of the Bremerton Bridge Blast event.

Sunny works with 300-500 vendors that have booths at her various events. Each vendor is a small business that needs outlets for sales and promotions. Sunny also books some 30 bands containing nearly 100 musicians, 80-90% of whom are local, including 14 bands at our Blackberry Festival.

Sunny said every community event she sponsors creates tourism and has its own economic impact. She estimates that the Blackberry Festival has almost a \$1 million impact on the local economy. This yearâ \in TMs festival is the 4th she has managed over the last six years (with a gap for COVID).
