PROGRAM

Travis Merrigan from SafeStreets Bremerton was our guest speaker. He said his organization is working on behalf of the next generation, especially schoolchildren. Although his mother thinks his generation is overprotective, Travis said, "The streets of the city have become unsafe for a lot of us, and especially for kids." He attributes the decline in safe streets to three factors: 1. there are more cars on the road, 2. cars are getting bigger than they used to be and 3. everyone is driving faster. He said a 2021 study done by the Washington Traffic Safety Commission showed that 19 out of 20 drivers are driving over the speed limit. The situation will become increasingly worse, as an estimated 45,000 to 60,000 residents will move to Bremerton in the next 20 years. There are several simple fixes for the traffic situation: better lane striping to manage traffic flow, more bike/pedestrian lanes, curb extensions and sidewalks.
