This Week's Program, August 24th

Nancy McDaniel "Chimacum—In the Valley, Near the Water"

Nancy McDaniel, speaking about her recently published book, "Chimacum--In the Valley Near the Water." Nancy was born and raised in Chimacum and attended Chimacum Schools for all twelve years.

Nancy's maternal family belonged to the Snohomish tribe, while her grandfather was a



European immigrant. She has been married to Glen Davis for 44 years. She earned a BA in Business with the goal of a career in hospital administration.

Nancy attended ROTC in college, receiving her Second Lieutenant commission on graduation day. She "beat the odds" several times in her career--first was her selection to be a Medical Service Corps officer, and later, being accepted into a Master's degree program with the choice of any school she wanted--she chose Trinity University in San Antonio, the top school in the country for Hospital Administration.

Her promotions over the years ended with leading the hospital in Alamogordo, New Mexico, following a stint in the Tri-Service Office Washington, D.C. Her final position was Chief of Staff of the Human Services Division at Armstrong Labs in San Antonio.

After retirement, Nancy worked for the contractor Carta closing Brooks Air Force Base. She returned to Chimacum for her retirement from military life to the ranch owned by her family. She was The Department Program Manager of Emergency Services in Jefferson County for ten years part-time. She also has volunteered for ten years at the Washington State School for the Blind. Wild Fires - high Levels of Concern for Our Area Wildfires can occur anywhere, at any time. Local Fire Chief Bret Black commented, "*Recently, we have had grass and vegetation fires throughout District 1, including Beaver Valley, in the City of Port Townsend and Port Ludlow.* We need people to be prepared".

Due to weather and drought, Jefferson County will experience a higher-than-average wildfire potential for the next few months.



Residents are reminded to **<u>BE READY</u>**, **<u>GET SET</u>**, **<u>GO EARLY</u>**. Chief Black added, "Have a *GO BAG* and do not wait to be told to leave.

We have increased firefighter staffing and training to address the elevated wildfire threat; the risk is genuine. Evacuations are typically directed by law enforcement, but they will also be overwhelmed, like the fire department. *If you feel threatened by smoke or a wildfire, evacuate early!"* To receive emergency notifications, sign up for <u>Nixle</u>.

The Quilcene Food Bank

The Quilcene Food Bank is breaking ground on a desperately needed new facility on September 7, 2023, @ 10:00 am.

1. Our new location will be 161 Herbert St, Quilcene. We feed over 350 clients a week, and the numbers keep growing. "The existing facility is too small, with no heat or air conditioner in the food storage area and limited parking. "The pandemic also highlighted that we need additional



storage to store extra food in an emergency," said Leslie Tippins, Quilcene Food Bank Manager.

- 2. The Quilcene Food Bank operates out of the Community Center in Quilcene. The Quilcene Food Bank also supports the Coyle community by sending a weekly pop-up food pantry to the Laurel B. Johnson Coyle Community Center.
- 3. Founded in 1987, the **Jefferson County Food Bank Association** (**JCFBA**) has served the community, particularly East Jefferson County. With a dedicated team of volunteers, the JCFBA tirelessly works to address the region's pressing issue of food insecurity. By offering a diverse range of food and hygiene supplies, they extend a helping hand to 2,700 to 3,900 households, positively impacting the lives of nearly 8,000 individuals monthly.

The History of Port

Townsend. by Jack McKay. (The original source is ChatGPT.) Port Townsend, Washington, has a rich history that dates back to the 19th century. Here is an overview of its historical development:

The Perfect Pitch: Attract New Members in 60

Seconds by Jon Smith on the Multiview site. (Adapted to our Rotary Club by Jack McKay)

The elevator pitch is essential in any organization's marketing arsenal for attracting new members to our Rotary Club.



- 1. The idea behind the elevator pitch is simple: a brief description of our Rotary Club that can be delivered in the time it takes to ride an elevator (about 1-2 minutes).
- 2. It needs to be engaging and informational, so prospective members know who you are, but it leaves room for curiosity. To create an effective elevator pitch, there are a few key elements you need to nail down.

Know your story

The first step to crafting an elevator pitch is knowing your story.

- When working on your association's elevator pitch, come up with a few key points you want to emphasize: *your history, your mission, and why you do what you do.* All these elements are essential because they help define who you are as an organization, which is crucial when crafting your elevator pitch.
- 2. Once you have those three main points down, you can work on finding ways of communicating them in just one sentence or phrase. For example: "Empowering members since 2023, we're a vibrant community

driving innovation, connections, and lasting success." Do this with each element of your story you want to incorporate and find what sticks.

Understand your audience

- 1. *Understanding who you speak to is critical for a successful elevator pitch*. If you want to get people's attention and keep them listening, it's crucial that you know exactly what drives them and what their specific needs are.
- 2. Understanding what your target members hope to gain from hearing about our Rotary Club will help guide the content and delivery so that nothing gets lost in translation.
- 3. *Consider our Rotary Club and how you want to be perceived*. For example, suppose you're an organization attempting to attract and engage professionals in the importance of community service. In that case, it's wise to include industry jargon and language that will resonate with potential members.
- 4. This also builds trust amongst potential members if they feel you know who you're talking to and what you're talking about, reassuring them that you can provide the connections and assistance they may seek.

Be aware of attention spans.

- 1. You have a short window to make a compelling case for why someone should join your Rotary Club, so getting straight to the point is essential. Your elevator pitch should be clear enough that anyone can understand it, regardless of their knowledge level or background in your field.
- 2. *Showcase why joining our Rotary Club would benefit them* as individual members and how they can help build an even stronger community through their involvement with our Club.
- 3. An effective elevator pitch will also **demonstrate what makes our Rotary Club unique.**
- 4. *Potential members will want to know who you are and why they should be interested*, not a lecture with general statements and vague selling points.

Conclusion

- 1. *You must have an elevator pitch ready to go* no matter who you are within the Club -- and where you are in public.
- 2. You never know who will be listening and could potentially become a new member of our Club.

3. *And remember that you're not just selling yourself but our Club as well.* So, don't forget to emphasize the value our Club brings.
