# Port Orchard Rotary 50th Year Project â€" Givens Park Paycourts




It's a big deal to turn 50! As Port Orchard Rotary Club celebrates their 50th anniversary, Rotarians are once again redoubling their efforts to make their local community a better place to live.

Their chosen 50th anniversary project is a collaboration with the City of Port Orchard to revitalize a run-down park and play court facility in the heart of downtown.

The project is part of the community gathering space that includes the Givens The project is part of the community gathering space that includes the Givens Community Center, South Kitsap Western Little League fields, South Kitsap Peewee Association, Picnicking spaces, green space, and public restrooms. Several Port Orchard Rotarians remember playing on these courts as kids—oh so many years ago!—and this project will revitalize this essential facility for youth and adult recreation. Rotarians will refurbish the existing dilapidated basketball and tennis play courts, addressing the rough and uneven asphalt, surface cracks, rusty fencing, aged lighting, and overgrown surrounding landscaping.

The unusable Court surfaces will be ground down to make a strong base for newly installed court surfaces which will be strong and weather resistant.




The basketball court will be repainted to include striping for a Futsal court, the first in Kitsap County. (Futsal is also known as speed soccer and is played in a smaller arena set to the size of a standard basketball court). The tennis courts will be refurbished and striped to include both tennis and pickleball striping. Pickleball is the fastest growing sport in the nation, and it was invented in Kitsap County. As you can imagine, there's a huge demand for Racquet sport courts in the South Kitsap area.

All new security fencing and lighting will be added for safety as well as a section of public seating along the perimeter of the facility.



A grant from the Washington State Recreation and Conservation Office was awarded to the City of Port Orchard for approximately half the needed funds to build the project as planned.

The Port Orchard Rotary Club has pledged \$50,000 in match funds and is championing the fundraising effort to achieve full \$150,000 funding. Through a grassroots campaign of community engagement, project awareness, and grant writing, Rotarians hope to see this project built within their 50<sup>th</sup> year of service. # Port Orchard Rotary Club Changing lives in East Pokot, Kenya

The free shades of the shades

The first two weeks in July, Chris Cairns and family (Ian, Michelle, Bruce, Evan and Ashley) went to Kenya to visit the recipients of the Port Orchard Rotary Club Global Grants that had been facilitated by Bob Cairns.

The family was enthusiastically greeted by the people of Natan in East Pokot, Baringo County who benefited from the first sand dam. As is custom they were greeted by traditional songs and dance. This time they were also surprised with gifts of blankets, head bands, necklaces and bracelets. The people of Natan expressed their gratitude for the sand dam and how it had changed their lives. They reported that they were using the ceramic water filters that had been given to them as part of the second global grant. The Cairns were not able to visit all the sand dams but did visit another one in Lokoukani that had been damaged. Currently, efforts are being made to have the sand dam fixed before the next rainy season.

Since this area was experiencing another famine, maize was passed out to the people of Natan and to schools in the area.

On the second day 2 schools that had been the beneficiaries of the Global Grant were visited. At the Chesakam school, they were also greeted by song and dance. The students who performed had come in second in a regional contest just a couple of weeks before they arrived. Soccer balls were given out to the students by Bruce and Evan Cairns. School supplies were presented by Ian Cairns. This school has a borehole



that was repaired with the first global grant. They currently are requesting that piping be put in from the borehole to the school kitchen so that the students donâte'''t have to take time to collect water for the kitchen in the morning before lunch. The borehole is available to the local people also. Chris had a chance to talk to some of them and again heard how access to water had changed the lives of the people in the area.



Cheptunoyo was another school that benefited from the Global Grant by rainwater harvesting. This has changed the schoolae should be a doubt of the water tanks had been damaged and needed to be replaced. Cheptunoyo is a boarding school. They have bed frames but no mattresses for the beds. The students tried putting cardboard over the bed springs to sleep but ended up sleeping on the cardboard on the floor. Soccer balls were distributed again by Bruce and Evan.



The Bob and Chris Library is next to the Cheptunoyo school. Christine the Cheptunoyo headmaster reports that the library is well used. More shelves are needed as many of the books are on the floor. Also, Christine reports more room is needed as students are coming from many other schools to use the library. Christine would like to find a way to make the library accessible to even more students as it is the only library in an area the size of Kitsap County. Again, they heard how much the library had made a change in the lives of the students and their families.

The family had a chance to meet with Florence and Patrick who were teachers that had attended the VTT grant that the Port Orchard Rotary Club had participated in with Rotary clubs in the Seattle district. The teachers reported that the training they received had had a significant impact on their lives and well as those of their students. Of course, they asked for more training.
