## **Process for Adding New Members**

Editor's note: on May 1, President Glen reminded us about the process for adding new members to the club. The following is an excerpt from our Bylaws dtd June 27, 2024

### Method of Electing Members - Rotary Club of Silverdale Bylaws

Section 1: Active Members.

a. The Member Application shall be submitted to the Board by the Membership Committee for consideration at the next Board meeting. The Membership Committee will have the opportunity to discuss the proposed member prior to the Board's decision.

b. The Board shall consider and approve or disapprove the recommendations of the Membership Committee and shall then notify the proposer, through the Membership Committee, of its decision.

c. If the decision of the Board is favorable, the nominee's name will be published to the club, and the prospective member shall be invited to participate in an orientation session. The purpose of the orientation is to introduce prospective members to club leadership and to fully inform them of the duties and responsibilities of membership, including financial and club activity participation. Orientation shall also serve as the primary opportunity for the prospective member to question club leadership about membership, club policies, and activities.

d. If no objection to the proposal is received by the Board from any members of the club within 7 days following publication of the prospective member's name, the prospective member will be considered elected to membership.

e. If any verbal or written objection has been filed with the Board in the time prescribed, it shall consider the objection at the next regular or special meeting of the Board. The President shall cause the factual basis of the objection(s) to be determined and reported to the Board. The Board shall vote on admission to membership in accordance with its regular voting process. A majority of the Board must vote to approve the member in order for the member to go forward.

f. Following the member's election to membership as herein provided, the Secretary shall report the name to Rotary International. The member shall be formally inducted as a new member at a regular meeting of the club.

## **Central Kitsap Food Bank - Program on May 1**

Central Kitsap Food Bank provides food at no cost in a caring and respectful manner to people in need in our community while preserving the dignity of those they serve.



#### The CK Food Bank gave an eye-opening presentation with their

focus on who in our community they serve. While many believe that those who frequent the food bank are mostly homeless or unemployed, those people only make up a small fraction of the population they serve here in Central Kitsap. While it's true that their patrons include those listed above, as well as seniors on a fixed income, college students, those living with medical conditions or disabilities, young people struggling to find jobs, and families who are employed but can't stretch their dollar far enough to cover rent, utilities and food, many don't realize that there is another demographic that makes for a large percentage of people they serve - active duty military members and their families.

It has been reported that 1 in 4 military personnel live with food insecurity. More than 1.25 million veterans live below the poverty line. Nearly 1.4 million U.S. military veterans struggle to receive the food they need to live a healthy life in retirement.

CK Food Bank is currently working on expanding their delivery program, so families can order their groceries from the food bank online and have them delivered to their homes. One challenge here is finding people with base access so that they're able to deliver groceries to the families in need who live on base.




