From WTO '99 to New Media, a Rotary Peace Fellow's Journey



As Founder and Principal of Madrona Bureau (MB), Gavin P. Sullivan has both written and executive produced critically acclaimed feature documentary, TV, and commercial work. Under MB he has written and produced feature documentary films: ARGENTINA FUTBOL CLUB (Premiere, Havana Film Festival, Special Jury Award, IFFI Goa International Film Festival), HUSKY LOYAL (PBS), and produced and directed MANIFEST JUSTICE (PBS, Emmy Nominated), FLAT TOWN (Premiere, New Orleans Film Festival), OUT OF THE FIRE (PBS, Emmy Winner), 16 LIVES (Emmy Winner), as well as the current affairs TV series Inside Outlook (NBC, NWCN), which Sullivan produced, directed and hosted. He is the recipient of three Emmy Awards (NATAS).

To pay the bills, MB has built out a healthy and diverse portfolio of commercial clients. Past work includes the creative development and production of branded content for Apple, Samsung, United Farm Workers, Sub-Pop Records, Starbucks, City Year, KEXP and a slew of state and national political campaigns, as well as pro-bono work for community based foundations and non-profit organizations.

Hands on Environmental Project on April 19 from 9-1 pm.

Our dynamic Rotary District 5030 Environmental Sustainability Committee is very active this year and is inviting members of our club to participate in a hands on environmental project on April 19 from 9-1 pm.

We will be working on the banks of Seattle's only river namely the Duwamish River. Our work will include removing invasive species and planting indigenous trees and shrubbery. This is a District-wide project and we need 40 volunteers to join us.

At the beginning at 9 am, we will have George Blumberg, historian with the Port of Seattle, share an update on the major cleanup being coordinated by the EPA as a Superfund site. We will also have someone from the Duwamish Tribe share about the native history going back 10,000 years in connection with the Duwamish River.

There will be coffee and donuts in the morning followed by vegetarian lunch around noon.

Please let Dave Spicer know if you are interested. This is first come first serve and expect to hit 40 volunteers very quickly as we anticipate Rotarians from other clubs will want to join in the action.

Support Black Colleges' Work Equalizing Playing Field

For more than 80 years, the United Negro College Fund has supported Black high school students in pursuit of higher education.

As the nation's political climate has changed in ways that could make it more difficult for students of color to enter college, it's refreshing to see efforts underway in Seattle that support their college attendance.

One way is by exposing high school students to historically Black colleges and universities.

For years, the UNCF and other civic organizations have provided college tours to HBCUs. The tours take students from the Pacific Northwest to historic colleges throughout the South, such as Spelman College and Morehouse College in Atlanta, Ga., Tennessee State and Fisk University in Nashville, Tenn., and Grambling State and Southern University in Louisiana.

"It's an incredible experience for them," said **Linda Thompson-Black**, Area Development Director for UNCF Washington, Oregon & Alaska. "They actually get to talk to presidents or vice presidents of the schools."

The U.S. Supreme Court ended race-conscious college admissions in 2023, and admissions of Black and Latino students at predominantly white schools have dropped. That makes HBCUs not only a more affordable choice, but a more welcoming one, Thompson-Black said.

HBCUs produce 17% of Black bachelor's degrees, and about 24% of STEM degrees obtained by Black students. Noted graduates of HBCUs include Vice President Kamala Harris (Howard), Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. (Morehouse), former Homeland Security

Secretary Jeh Johnson (Morehouse) and Oprah Winfrey (Tennessee State).

But preparation is key. To get students ready for college, the UNCF offers a yearlong program of workshops that help students prepare for college life, research and apply for scholarships, and write application essays. The average scholarship granted by the Seattle UNCF for Washington students is \$13,410.

Since all won't be able to go on tours, some HBCUs come to Seattle. Seattle Public Schools will host a Black College Expo Saturday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Rainier Beach High School.

Students can interact with representatives from about 50 colleges.

They can apply for admission and some schools will waive application fees and even grant admission on the spot.

Higher education, whether at a community college or four-year institution, remains the greatest equalizer when it comes to opportunities in life.

To help to continue that goal, the Seattle UNCF will host a fundraising gala on Feb. 22 at the Hyatt Regency Seattle. Proceeds will help sponsor scholarships for deserving students and other program needs.

Indeed, the UNCF's motto remains true: "A mind is a terrible thing to waste but a wonderful thing to invest in."

Yacht Club Task Force Update *(by Carol Butler)*

The letter sent to the Seattle Yacht Club on January 28th, courtesy of Stephanie Feldt, did result in a response. UDRC and the Yacht Club are in current discussions attempting to clarify questions that arose in that response and further communication from the Yacht Club.

As previously stated, the Task Force continues to contact venues on the list as well as those that have surfaced since January 29th. To date Task Force Members (Terry Cicero, Lisa Edwards, Doug Frick, Kirk Laughlin, Sally Porter Smith, Paula Williams, and Carol Butler) completed initial attempts and/or actual contacts with 66% of the venues. Multiple places look promising for UDRC weekly meetings. Task Force members will visit each of these venues to thoroughly vet them.

On the other hand, the Task Force eliminated 27% of the venues contacted. These venues were not suitable for a variety of reasons: from being too small to more expensive than the Yacht Club to not responding to multiple requests for information.

The next update from the Task Force will be available on February 14th.



Review of Education/Health Projects Co-Sponsored by UDRC in Chile *(by Paula Laschober)*

During my time in Chile in January, I visited eight Rotary projects in the Municipalities of Concepcion, Los Angeles, and Santa Barbara, along with Rotarians from clubs in those cities that initiated the projects and asked for our assistance in making them a reality. Seven of the projects are English language labs and one is an echotomograph (fetal monitoring equipment) with screen and printer that is used by a community clinic at the foot of the Andes (in Santa Barbara) to show parents how a fetus is growing and to diagnose any problems. All of the equipment we have helped purchase is in good condition, functioning as planned and kept in secure areas.

“Republic of Ecuador” School was a 2022-23 project with a total cost of \$26,313, and our contribution amounting to \$2,813.

The five language labs in Los Angeles are all in rural schools: Chacayal Sur, El Peral, Itilhue, Virquenco (Santa Fe) and El Nogal. Installation of the labs took place 2018-2024. The total cost of all five labs amounted to \$118,211, and our club contributed \$32,601.

Most of the schools are first-eighth grade, with “Republic of Ecuador” going through high school. Personnel we met at the schools noted how important the English lab was to their success. All had increased enrollments since lab installation, which is significant because the municipal governments provide funding to these schools based on the number of students they attract.

English proficiency continues to be important in Chile, both for advancement to higher education, and also for many jobs.

The fetal monitoring equipment was a 2014-15 Global Grant project with a total cost of \$45,050, to which our club contributed \$4,300.

Two of the language labs are in the Concepcion area: Fundo Chanco rural school and “Republic of Ecuador” School in a low-income area of the city. Fundo Chanco was a 2019-20 project costing \$21,000, to which our club contributed \$5,750. “Republic of
