
David Montgomery & Anne Bikle Using the Hidden Half of Nature to Grow a Revolution

"If there is magic on this planet, it is contained in water." (Loren Eisley)

Water covers 70% of our planet. But fresh water—the stuff we drink, bathe in, irrigate our farm fields with—is rare. According to the World Wildlife Fund, only 3% of the world's water is fresh water, and two-thirds of that is tucked away in frozen glaciers or otherwise unavailable. As a result, some 1.1 billion people worldwide lack access to water, and a total of 2.7 billion find water scarce for at least one month of the year.

Inadequate sanitation is also a problem for 2.4 billion people—they are exposed to diseases, such as cholera and typhoid fever, and other water-borne illnesses. Two million people, mostly children, die each year from diarrheal diseases alone. That includes 144 million people who are dependent on surface water, much of it polluted by fecal contamination. Lack of access to clean water locks families, communities and countries into lasting disease and poverty.

University District Rotary is committed to addressing the pressing global need for fresh water. In the last 12 years, our club has allocated \$85,000+ for 19 water projects in 9 countries. Not only that, but because most of those projects were part of larger Rotary grants—several of them Global Grants—our participation was leveraged to more than \$1 million. And that's just in the last dozen years—we've been doing water projects for much longer.

Let's 'unpack' those figures with some examples. This week we'll feature water projects in Africa.

Wells for Ethiopia

Since 2002, **Ezra Teshome, Dave Weaver** and **Dave Spicer** have collaborated on water projects in **Ethiopia**, where 33 million out of a population of about 105 million persons lack access to a safe water source and 89 million lack access to improved sanitation. Many mothers and their daughters walk great distances each day to fetch water—sometimes as far as 10 miles or more roundtrip. There's no time for school, no time to train for the future. Survival is paramount.

Over time, the "Two Daves and Ezra" have developed borehole or spring-fed gravity flow wells to provide water to 25 Ethiopian villages. Four years ago, they received funding from our club to go back to rehabilitate 8 of those villages where water systems had failed. During the last five months, Dave S. and Ezra have been working on yet another major critical project for the village of Shechana Roma and its 3,000 men, women and children. After extensive collaboration with the Addis Ababa West Rotary Club, our club submitted a Global Grant request on February 3. It involves a \$76,000 budget for drilling the borehole well, providing solar power to pump it, as well as *(continued, p. 3)*

two water storage tanks (10,000 liters each) and separate sanitation facilities for girls, boys and adults at the village school.

In the nearly twenty years the Daves and Ezra have been working on Ethiopian projects, they estimate somewhere between 125,000 to 150,000 people have benefited from these projects, as well as close to one million livestock like goats and oxen.

Our UDRC has generously committed \$10,000 to this newest Ethiopian water project and helped fund all prior water projects. It is estimated that the overall cost of these projects has been in the range of \$450,000. One project involved an RI Matching Grant (not Global Grant back then) several years ago for 24

villages in Ethiopia with a total budget of \$305,000.

Examples of water projects in other African countries

Dave Spicer has been involved in another 3 water projects in the countries of **Kenya, Rwanda** and **Nigeria**. **Omara Abe** has headed projects in his native **Uganda**, working with Rotarians from Gulu to drill bore hole wells for refugees displaced by internal insurgencies between 2001 and 2010 in Northern Uganda, a region with broken or nonexistent water supplies.

Altogether, about 50% of club funding for water projects in recent years has gone to African countries.

From Club-to-Club to Global Grants, funding avenues address the need.

The world of grants can be daunting to an aspiring applicant. Many University District members can help guide you...just look for their names elsewhere in this article!

A basic primer:

All projects must have a **primary Rotary club sponsor** (i.e., University District Rotary), and a **host-country Rotary club** (e.g., the Rotary Club of Patan in Nepal).

In **Club-to-Club Projects**, one or more clubs donate directly to a host country club. An example of this kind of grant: In **Malawi**, **Adrian John** sponsored a project in 2019 for a clean-water borehole and pump in Masanjala Village, where we've also supported an elementary school. Cost for the well: \$5,100. The funds came from our Rotary club and the Limbe Rotary Club of Malawi.

In district grants—in our case, District 5030—the district matches funds contributed by individual clubs.


Global grants support large **international** activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes in **Rotary's** areas of focus. By working together, we respond to real community needs, and clubs and districts strengthen their **global** partnerships. Here's an example of a Global Grant: *In East Pokot, Kenya, Paula Laschober* sponsored our club's \$2,250 contribution to a \$108,609 Global Grant led by the Port Orchard Rotary Club in 2014. It had many other contributing Rotary Clubs. The project provided potable water for human and livestock consumption via three riverbank rainwater harvesting systems and improvements to one existing borehole. East Pokot is an area of extreme poverty that has been experiencing long-term drought. About 5,000 people will benefit from the project. The Kenyan partner is the Uashin Gishu Rotary Club.




