



New Member Eric Gerard Parsons Inducted February 9, 2024 (by Rosemary Aragon)

Today we are inducting Eric Gerard Parsons. With him is his sponsor, Jeff Werthan.

Eric Gerard Parsons has a Bachelor's degree in Print Journalism from Howard University. He holds a Master's degree in Urban Affairs & Policy Analysis from The New School.

Professionally, he has a strong background in leadership, partnership development, advocacy, and community engagement in various sectors, with a focus on promoting social change, diversity, equity, and inclusion.

He is currently the Director of Partnership and Advancement at the **Urban League of**

Metropolitan Seattle. Prior to that, he served as the Acting Executive Director and Senior Manager of Philanthropy at the **Community Roots Housing Foundation (f**ormerly known as the Capital Hill Housing PDA). The organization develops and manages affordable housing in Seattle (currently housing more than 2,000 people in almost 50 buildings across Seattle). One of their apartments here in our neighborhood is the Burke Gilman Gardens

Eric also held the position of Director of Community Engagement at **Elliott Bay Book Company**, where they focused on promoting social change and advocating for diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging. Eric Gerard formed key partnerships with various organizations and institutions to drive meaningful change and public policy reform. Before that, Eric worked as the Director of Operations & Administration at the **Episcopal Diocese of California**, where they established strategic partnerships and developed outreach strategies to benefit marginalized and underrepresented populations.

Additionally, Eric served as a Research Analyst at the **Insight Center for Community Economic Development**, where they led policy research and advocacy initiatives to address racial equity and economic inclusion. Eric Gerard was also the Director of Legislative Affairs and Policy Advocacy at the **New World Symphony**, focusing on legislative activities.

Eric's earlier experiences include roles as a **Senior Policy Advisor at the City of Seattle**, where they supported the City Council in establishing progressive policies, and as the Director of the Ready-to-Earn Fund at the Seattle Jobs Initiative, where they created a program to eliminate barriers to employment for low-income individuals.

Furthermore, Eric worked as the Director of Partnership for Washington's Future at the **Children's Alliance**, where they developed plans and programs to rebuild the human service "safety net" in Washington state. Eric Gerard also served as a Project Director at the National Urban League, managing a national program focused on math and science education reform for low-income parents.

Please listen up to this.....One thing no one would know about Eric is that in the 1966-67 school year, he integrated a school in the Town of Dunn, Wisconsin. The Town of Dunn was near Madison, where his family later moved. It wasn't as dramatic as the Little Rock Central High School 9; nevertheless it was an unpleasant experience.

Lunar New Year (by Son Michael Pham)



What is Lunar New Year?

Gaze up into the night sky and what do you see? A beaming full moon, a crescent shape, or just a sliver in the sky? The moon's appearance changes in phases because it orbits the earth, changing its

relationship to the earth and sun and causing the part we see illuminated to change. A lunar calendar is based on the moon's cycles.

Several cultures throughout the world use lunisolar calendars, based mainly on a lunar calendar but adding "intercalary months." The standard lunar year is 354 days, whereas the solar based year is approximately 365 1/4 days. Without the intercalary month, the difference would build up over time, and the Spring festival, for example, would no longer fall in Spring. The intercalary month helps to make sure that the lunar year stays in line with the solar cycle.

Within the calendar, the Lunar New Year usually falls on the second new moon after the winter solstice, the first day of the first month.

Show up for dinner with your dish, and uh, that's it...


