Program for March 19

Raymond Connell and Ezra Teshome Boys Town Global Grant



Ray Connell and Ezra Teshome will discuss a Rotary global grant project to revitalize a well at the Boys Town in Hanna Town, Kingston, Jamaica. The project will serve more than 3,000 impoverished youth who use the facility for sports and education.

The well was decommissioned seven years ago as the facility fell into disrepair, forcing management to purchase water at an unsustainable price.

Ray, a Jamaican living in Seattle, was vacationing on the island and visited the facility, a stone's throw from where he was

born on Oxford Street, Hanna Town. Upon his return to Seattle, he set about raising funds for the project. University District Rotary granted \$5,000 toward a Global Grant for the \$123,500 project for a solar-powered replacement well. Partner Rotary Clubs are Kingston, Downtown Kingston and St. Andrew in Jamaica. The co-sponsors for our club are Ray Connell and Ezra Teshome. Ray has also raised private contributions of about \$22,500 from friends, many of whom are members of the Friends of Jamaica of Seattle, a non-profit organization of which Connell is the president.

SHE'S A HERO. And SHE *TAKES ACTION!*Penny LeGate to emcee our March 26 fundraiser



Penny LeGate, a great friend and honorary member of our Rotary club, will lend her considerable energy and talent to emcee our fundraiser on March 26.

A five-time Paul Harris Fellow, Penny has traveled with our University District Rotary to Ethiopia, Ghana, India, Uganda and Vietnam. The principal of LeGate Productions and a veteran reporter, anchor and documentary producer, Penny plays a major role in sharing the story of Rotary's polio eradication and education efforts.

Penny began her Rotary trips in 2002, accompanying a delegation led by Ezra Teshome and Dave Weaver. She accompanied groups in Ethiopia almost every year thereafter.

"My job is to follow the immunization teams into the countryside to interview both those receiving—and giving—the immunizations," she said in a blog interview with *I Want Her Job*. "I craft these stories and produce videos for Rotary. It's rewarding to know I can give others a kick in the pants and excite and inspire them. Members get the chance to see the faces of the people doing the immunization work and can hear from them and see how dedicated they are through these presentations. It then inspires them to re-up on their contribution to the fight for another year."

Last August, the entire continent of Africa was declared polio-free. How fitting that Penny should be our emcee as we celebrate Ezra Teshome and this achievement!

Partners for Work (PFW) is one of our club's treasured projects and it is a Rotary District 5030 project that creates employment opportunities for people with developmental disabilities by

linking Rotarian business leadership and job candidates to find meaningful paid work. Since 2003 Partners for Work has helped create more than 130 jobs in District 5030! The University District Rotary Club has helped create jobs, had Mock Interviews and hired Greeters for the last 11 years through this program.

In our District, people with disabilities can be found working within a variety of occupations and industries. Employees from Partners for Work are office assistants, warehouse/manufacturing stocking associates, membership/service assistants, and utility/janitorial assistants. This project focuses on creating new opportunities for people who have traditionally been left out of the job market by having Rotarians become more aware of individual skills and abilities that exist within their own communities.

The project's target population is people who are over 18 years of age who have developmental disabilities and want to work. These individuals have valuable skills to offer the workplace, yet their employment rate is very low (30%) and many cannot meet the established job requirements set by business' human resource departments. Rotarians are often the top people in their companies and play a key networking and leadership role in helping open the door towards paid work.

Invitation to Join Rotarian Ad Hoc Social Justice Group (by Jeff Werthan)

Every Saturday morning, a group of Rotarians from several different clubs meets virtually to listen to a speaker and ask questions pertaining to various social justice issues. Our group has created a safe space, that allows everyone to speak his/her mind in a non-threatening environment. "Non-threatening" does not always mean comfortable and does often mean challenging. It's an opportunity to listen, learn, comment and play the devils advocate.



Our group is based upon a similar group in Portland, OR, that Sala Sweet has been attending every Saturday. Sala brought Portland to my attention, and I started attending as well. Their large group (usually 35-50 attendees) has been meeting for awhile and they have branched out to work with many Portland area based organizations. They have also broken down their Saturday group into several smaller groups that are able to concentrate on different aspects of social justice.

With Sala in the lead, we started a similar group here in Seattle. Since our first meeting last November 7th, our speakers have included a combination of educators, state representatives and other elected officials, community spokespersons/organizations, corporate spokespersons, and police and police reform advocates. This Saturday our speaker will be Seattle School Superintendent, Denise Juneau, followed by interim Seattle Police Chief, Adrian Diaz, on the 27th and Bellevue Police Chief, Steve Mylett, on April 3rd.

Invitation to Join Duwamish River Cleanup to Celebrate Earth Day (by Dave Spicer)

Our Board just unanimously approved a fun Service Day for our Rotarians.

On Saturday, April 17, from 10-1 pm. Rotarians are invited to gather and do important clean up and restorative work at the Duwamish River. This will help mark Earth Day that started back in April, 1970. This is the brainstorm of Linda Harris and Linda, Jeff Werthan, Bill Herkes and Dave Spicer all scouted this opportunity out last week. The activity is sponsored by our Environmental Sustainability Committee.

This event will be in collaboration with the Duwamish River Cleanup Coalition and we will be working with them to remove invasive species and plant new trees and shrubbery along the banks of the Duwamish River. This is the location of a Superfund site that is being restored to the point that salmon, Great Blue Herons and other native species are just beginning to return and we can play a role to continue improving the habitat.



All you need to bring are good boots, leather gloves, masks and a water bottle. There will be porta potties on site. Tools will be provided along with the shrubbery and tree saplings we will be planting. We need a few Rotarians who are comfortable being in kayaks as well so we can do some cleanup on the river.

Lunch will be provided at 1 pm.


