Every Saturday morning, a group of Rotarians from several different clubs meets virtually to listen to a speaker and ask questions pertaining to various social justice issues. Our group has created a safe space, that allows everyone to speak his/her mind in a non-threatening environment. "Nonthreatening" does not always mean comfortable and does often mean challenging. It's an opportunity to listen, learn, comment and play the devils advocate.

Our group is based upon a similar group in Portland, OR, that Sala Sweet has been attending every Saturday. Sala brought Portland to my attention, and I started attending as well. Their large group (usually 35-50 attendees) has been meeting for awhile and they have branched out to work with many Portland area based organizations. They have also broken down their Saturday group into several smaller groups that are able to concentrate on different aspects of social justice.

With Sala in the lead, we started a similar group here in Seattle. Since our first meeting last November 7th, our speakers have included a combination of educators, state representatives and other elected officials, community spokespersons/organizations, corporate spokespersons, and police and police reform advocates. This Saturday, April 3, our speaker will be Bellevue Police Chief, Steve Mylett. On April 10, we'll hear from the Seattle Police Officers Guild President, and on April 17 we'll host a representative of the Urban League of Metropolitan Seattle.

# Invitation to Join Duwamish River Cleanup to Celebrate Earth Day (by Dave Spicer)

On **Saturday, April 17**, from 10 am-1 pm, Rotarians are invited to gather and do important clean up and restorative work at the Duwamish River. This will help mark Earth Day that started back in April, 1970. This is the brainstorm of Linda Harris and Linda, Jeff Werthan, Bill Herkes and Dave Spicer scouted this opportunity out a couple weeks ago. The activity is sponsored by our Environmental Sustainability Committee.



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This event will be in collaboration with the Duwamish River Cleanup Coalition and we will be working with them to remove invasive species and plant new trees and shrubbery along the banks of the Duwamish River. This is the location of a Superfund site that is being restored to the point that salmon, Great Blue Herons and other native species are just beginning to return and we can play a role to continue improving the habitat.

All you need to bring are good boots, leather gloves, masks and a water bottle. There will be porta potties on site. Tools will be provided along with the shrubbery and tree saplings we will be planting. We need a few Rotarians who are comfortable being in kayaks as well so we can do some cleanup on the river. Lunch will be provided at 1 pm.

# ISC Report: Chilean Rotary Club Implements School Language Lab

The North Concepcion Rotary Club of central Chile has recently completed an education project partially funded through our International Service Committee in the 2019-2020 year. The project implementation was delayed because of the COVID quarantine in Chile. Schools are still not open, but the Chilean Rotarians were able to work with local provider Soft-Net and the staff of the Fundo Chanco elementary school to get the furniture, equipment and software installed for a new, fully functional English language lab. The lab



includes work stations for 20 students and the teacher. The Fundo Chanco school is a public, rural school with 115 students in K-8 grades.

English is part of the basic required Chilean grade school curriculum. Per the standards of the Ministry of Education, English must be taught 2 hours/week for kindergarten through 4<sup>th</sup> grade, and 3 hours/week for 5<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grade. The language lab will be used at least 2-3 hours/week during class time by all students, including those in kindergarten. However, it will also be available at other times so students can work individually to improve their speaking and comprehension abilities.


According to Chilean Ministry of Education

calculations, 83% of the students in the Fundo Chanco area are considered to come from "vulnerable" situations—which means poverty and unstable homes. They do not have the possibility of attending better equipped schools or taking private classes after school to supplement classroom English lessons, and they receive little help from home with their studies. With good training in English and more opportunities to practice afforded by the lab, they will be able to more easily access higher education opportunities, scholarships and higher paying jobs in the future.

This \$21,000 language lab project was funded by \$5,750 from our club, \$2,000 from Seattle 4, \$1,000 from the Mill Creek club, a District 5030 matching grant of \$8,750, \$1,000 from District 4355 (Chile), and \$2,500 from the North Concepcion Rotary Club—the local host club who proposed it, after consulting with the Fundo Chanco principal and teachers about what they considered their highest priority. UDRC sponsors were Rosemary Aragon and Paula Laschober.

Our club has extensive experience working with the North Concepcion Rotary Club. In 2012, we collaborated to set up a language lab for the Concepcion girls' high school, Liceo de Niñas, to replace one that had been destroyed in an earthquake. In 2013 we collaborated on a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant to provide a computer lab, including Braille printer, for COALIVI, a school for the blind in Concepción. In 2014 we collaborated on a District matching grant to provide specialized wheelchairs and psychomotor learning equipment to COALIVI, which also serves children who are both blind and physically disabled.





The morning of Friday, April 2, Rotarians provided three students with disabilities the opportunity to try out and improve their job interview skills. This Partners for Work activity takes place every year, led by Lisa Latchford. This year, of course, it occurred through Zoom.

The three young people, who are transitioning into the world of work, are Josephine Nguyen (bottom right in above screen shot), Hale Beyerelein (second row, second from right, with glasses), and Jacob Houghton (third row, right). Josephine would like to find a customer service job. Hale has experience in general labor. Jacob has been an office assistant and food service worker. Rotarians who know of potential jobs for these youth should contact Lisa.
