New Member Angelina Jimenez Inducted into Club May 12 (by Rosemary Aragon)

Today, we are inducting Angelina Jimenez into U Rotary. Her sponsor Paula Williams is not with us today (She got a new knee yesterday).

She is an RN and an Advanced Certified Hospice and Palliative Nurse (CHPN)

She told me: "It always feels good to help patients and their family in

need and provide comfort. And just being present with them through their suffering almost always helps bring closure to the families during the patients' passing. It is a privilege as a hospice nurse to be there for the patients and their families during those times."

Angelina was born in Manila. She is a Philippines trained physician and Fellow in Obstetrics and Gynecology. She

worked at the General Armed Forces Hospital and served as a training medical officer. Holding the rank of Captain, she worked closely with the medical residents to ensure they received the training and education they needed to be successful Obstetricians and Gynecologists.

She immigrated to the US in 2010 with her two children sponsored by her mother.

Helping people has always been her passion so she decided to pursue a nursing credential in the US.

After getting her RN license, she worked for Crista Nursing and Rehab Center while also working as a supervisor for several adult homes in the Magnolia neighborhood.

In 2013, Angelina became a hospice nurse for Providence Hospice of Seattle.

Her dream was to create **Day by Day Nursing Services**. In this business, she utilizes her years of experience as a clinician and a nurse caregiver to provide safe, individualized, and comprehensive geriatric care with a team of trained and licensed caregivers. Day by Day's mission is to provide compassionate, professional and affordable health care in their homes. She started the company in 2020.

A quick reminder: Hospice is comfort care without aggressive or curative treatment. Usually, patients have cancer or serious illness with 6 months or less life expectancy. Palliative care is also comfort care but patients are often receiving curative treatment.

Angelina has a son and daughter. Angelo lives and works here in Seattle. Alexis is based in New York. In Seattle, she is surrounded by her mom, her brother and sister and their respective families. She is married to John Rosenberg, who she met when his dad was a resident of an adult family home she was managing.

Angelina joins many University Rotarians (and Americans) who brought their culture, expertise, and passions to the US from other countries.

You know I ask all our new members to tell me something about them that we wouldn't think of asking them about. Wow, Angelina makes delicious flan, scones and fruit tarts. *Oh, this is so impressive to those of us who have had many unsuccessful flan episodes.*

Our second new member today is Seth Barribeau. With him is his sponsor, Rick Jones.

For Seth, joining University Rotary is "coming back" to the Rotary family, after having been a high school exchange student in Jakarta, Indonesia. One comes back with an appreciation for the universal aspects of family life as well as the distinct, exciting elements of different cultures. A good dose of self confidence happens too.

He sees Rotary as an avenue to connect with the local community, and to contribute where his ability is needed and welcome. He has worked with a number of us on the Tiny Home build, Duwamish pruning/tree planting, and the recent International Committee Grant application review.

Seth was born in Ithaca, New York. When his parents finished grad school, they moved the family to South Africa to manage an avocado farm. In 1990 the family moved to Newport, Oregon, when the situation in South Africa became volatile. The family then immigrated to New Zealand.

He studied at the 150-year-old University of Canterbury, Christchurch, New Zealand, achieving a Ph.D. in zoology. He focused on understanding infection and immunity in natural systems. Those systems ranged from frogs, to ants, bees, mosquitoes, and humans. Some of his primary research was involved in understanding why some individuals/creatures get infected and others don't.

He pursued further academic studies after leaving New Zealand:

- Research at ethology lab, Kyoto University.
- A post doc at Emory University, working on insects and genomics.
- A post doc at ETH in Zurich to study the mechanisms that produce immune specificity and memory in bumblebees.
- A Fellowship with the Wisschenschaft College zu Berlin, where he studied how sociality alters the evolution of the immune system.
- Teaching and research in ecology and evolution of infectious diseases at the East Carolina University/University of North Carolina.
- Lecturer in ecological immunology at the University of Liverpool, UK.

It was in Liverpool that he met his wife, Nicole. She is an epidemiologist and has been working on maternal health and HIV in East Africa. She is now a program officer at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. This is what brought them to Seattle.

In Seattle, Seth pivoted to biotech. Seattle is among the top eight cities for biotech. Once here, he joined a dynamic startup that spun out of Fred Hutch called **Ozette Technologies**. Ozette has built a platform that solves two real problems for immunological data: **speed and scale**. In the bulletin, he explained that this platform interrogates immunological data at speed and scale to provide rapid insights in the immune system. The data they work with is extraordinarily complex and challenging, and there is a lot of it. Their analytical platform can streamline immunological data analysis, ensure repeatability, and further characterize the entire community of cells in a patient's sample. This allows faster turnaround to actionable analyses and entirely novel insights as so much more data is available to the researchers. Such data would profile clinical trials to see whether a new vaccine is working and why it's working.

Something people wouldn't think to talk to him about: Radio trapping PIT VIPERS in Japan.

On a lighter note, he says he knows next to nothing about SAILING, but is keen to remedy that.
