Blair Payson joined Olson Kundig in 2004 and has worked on both architectural and exhibit design projects, including the Century Project at the Space Needle, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation Discovery Center, and [storefront] Olson Kundig, as well as several residential projects across the Western United States and Mexico.

Blair's current work includes a new museum for an American sculptor, a higher education campus student center building, several residential projects, and a collaboration

with Recompose, a Washington state organization advocating for an alternative approach for burying the dead.

Blair regularly lectures and organizes conferences across the U.S. – most recently, he presented at the 2024 AIA National Conference in Washington D.C., 2024 Living Futures Conference in Atlanta, and the 2021 Advanced Building Skins Conference in Bern, Switzerland.

A maker at heart, Blair is an architect who revels in the details. From large cultural projects to temporary design interventions, Blair is able to distill large, complex projects into distinct culminating moments.

Lately, Blair's research has taken him on site visits to a subterranean cavern deep underground in one week, to hundreds of feet above

an urban landscape the next. This demonstrates not only the range of Blair's interests, but also his proclivity towards risk and experimentation.

Blair holds a Bachelor of Architecture from Rice University, and he is the recipient of several design awards for his work on the Gates Foundation Visitor Center and the Century Project at the Space Needle, among other projects.



UDRC to Participate in Solid Ground's Day of Service, Friday, August 23! (by Marella Alejandrino)



Roll up your sleeves and join us Friday, August 23, from 9am-noon for Solid Ground's Day of Service Celebrating 50 Years! You'll be in good company with 300+ Solid Ground community members as we gather across five Seattle volunteer sites to plant and tend to garden beds, beautify parks, clean up our Solid Ground Transportation's ACCESS bus fleet, and more!

Our Club will be volunteering at the Magnuson Park site. Solid Ground houses 400+ people at the Sand Point Campus at Magnuson Park. The campus provides permanent supportive housing, affordable permanent housing, and onsite support services for formerly homeless families and individuals. Since 1999, several thousand people have stayed at Sand Point Housing in their journeys from homelessness to stability. Folks who sign up for this project will meet at a location in the Sand Point neighborhood near campus (exact location TBD) for coffee and pastries, then get to work beautifying Magnuson Park. Seattle Parks and Recreation will have all the tools and instructions we need to complete our jobs.





Club Board Approves Service Fund Budget for 2024-25 (by Paula Laschober)

At its August 11 meeting the Club Board approved the Service Fund budget as shown below. The Service Fund is our club's foundation. The Service Fund Board decides the Total Sources available, while the Club President, per the bylaws, allocates that amount to each of the club's service functions.

Per Service Fund investment policy, each year's sources of funding include 4% of the average fund balance during the prior year in both the Permanent and the Bayles Scholarship Funds. The Service Fund Board also decides if it will take extra funding beyond the 4% from the "surplus" generated when the amount in the fund exceeds the policy target. In the last couple of budgets, based on member requests, the Service Fund Board decided to add more funding to scholarships from the Bayles Fund. That means, of course, that the next year the 4% average fund balance is less than it would have been had the "surplus" remained in the Bayles Fund.

DistrictThe Service Fund, by policy, holds 75% of its
invested funds in government bonds and 25% in
stocks. The bonds are held at amortized value and
are unaffected by the market. The stock
investments have experienced strong performance\$ 50,000in some years, which leads to the "surplus" over
target. However, not all years actually generate a
surplus. It is prudent to maintain a reasonable
surplus that can be used for years in which the
target is not reached.

Other Sources of funds for the budget include the revenue net of expenses derived from our annual fundraising event, funds contributed by the University of Washington for club member ushering at Husky football games, other donations, interest on funds in our Service Fund bank account, and any funds left over (unspent) from the prior year. This year (July 1, 2024-June 30, 2025) the Total Sources amount to \$215,900. This is very close to last year's amount available (\$216,500).
