

This week 04/24/25 - CFNCW Leadership Institute

The Leadership Institute of NCW was designed to empower community members to become advocates for children, families, and communities. This 20-session training program, held at Wenatchee Valley College, uses curriculum developed by the Parent Leadership Training Institute, a national program founded 30 years ago to build the civic capacity of parents, families, and local residents to improve community outcomes. The Institute recently graduated its first class.

Chelan County **Sheriff Mike Morrison** was sponsored and introduced by Madeline Barclay. He was accompanied by Ana Gonzalez, Program Manager for the Behavioral Health Unit (BHU).

Sheriff Morrison began by explaining how the BHU came to be, contrasting it with how things were done when he began working in the sheriff's office 20 years ago, stating that their approach to law enforcement has evolved from "old-school" into a more sophisticated operation. The **BHU** was initially a separate agency, but was recently absorbed and funded by the sheriff's office mostly through grants. It now has 6 staffers and 2 vehicles, who are always accompanied by an officer when in the field, but who have freed up most of the deputies for more typical police work. He continued by giving an update on recent successful high-profile investigations.

Ana Gonzalez explained her operation, e.g.

- Responds to 911 calls related to behavioral health
- Observations of erratic behavior on the street or in a park
- · Works with all local law enforcement teams
- · Provides assistance to anyone in crisis
- · Works with SWAT and hostage negotiating teams
- · She calls herself a "social service broker"
- Exploring the need for so many 911 calls

For safety, her team wears tactical vests on calls, as dictated by the sheriff's office. They carry no weapons, but do carry Narcan, radios, trauma kits, and other life-preserving measures. They may also seek to communicate with others having knowledge of the subject, such as physicians, therapists, or clinics. They may intervene with a phone call, especially if there are weapons involved. They are trained to provide support to individuals involved in active-shooter situations.
