Having an affinity and reputation for boating, **CHRIS CHEELEY** guided the Club through interesting boating stats with a typical Cheeley flair! So he piqued interest by talking about 2022 Boating Accidents. Did you know that 8 out of 10 accidents occur in boats less than 21 feet? There are 80,000 boats registered in Idaho, with 25% registered in Kootenai County. According to 2020 reports, there were 761 drownings in the U.S., and to everyone's surprise, or not, 86% occurred without life jackets. And what are the two leading factors to boating accidents? 1) Inattention and 2) Inexperience. So, after < 21' boats, the next type of watercraft with the most accidents? Canoes and kayaks.

PROGRAM

New NIC president, Nick Swayne, Ph.D., was introduced by **DAVID WOLD**. Dr. Swayne came to North Idaho College after serving as the Executive Director of *4-Virginia*, a collaborative partnership between eight universities in the state of Virginia. He is also the founder of a comprehensive academic innovation ecosystem at *James Madison University*.

Swayne earned his bachelor's degree from the *University of Idaho*, a master's in public administration from *Northeastern University* and a doctorate in postsecondary strategic leadership from *James Madison University*. Nick and his wife Nicky have two grown children and a lab named Stout! [As an aside – Nick and Nicky. How cool is that!]

Nick began his talk by telling Rotarians how happy he was to receive such a nice reception for being a *University of Idaho* graduate. Something he wasn't accustomed to experiencing on the east coast. He also told the Club that he's not angry and is not a yeller, but as a second lieutenant and artillery officer in the *U.S. Army*, they didn't figure out the need to wear hearing protection until years later, "So I have a bit of hearing loss. Know that I'm not angry, nor am I yelling at you." Nick served in Iraq, Bosnia and Saudi Arabia.

What does he like doing most? "Building partnerships with big groups." His military experience included workgroups of +600 people and multimillion dollar budgets. "Notice, it's the military, guys."

Nick encouraged members to check out *JMU X-Labs*, something reminiscent of *Gizmo-CdA*, found on NIC's campus. He described both makerspaces in complimentary ways, yet *Gizmo* is about twice the size and both are "partners that make the magic." He also talked about *First Lego League of Virginia* as a way to attract and inspire 4th and 5th graders. "Younger people need to see potential at an early age is critical."

So why did I come to NIC? "There's nothing wrong with 4-year institutions, yet they deal in a lot of theory, whereas 2-year programs deal in practice-based applied learning. Whether NIC students choose to go on to a 4-year institution, or not, the one thing they want to do is 'upscale. Grow from their 2-year experience."

"We teach to problem solve, innovate and start from a hypothesis. It's okay to test and pivot while making small changes to improve."

What are my four goals: 1) Students, 2) Faculty, 3) Staff and 4) Community. "We need to fix accreditation issues," which Nick emphasized as "governance," not "academics." "Academics are sound."

Some of our challenges? "Maintaining an important culture as we face faculty retirements. Rebuilding trust while communicating, sharing and being transparent. We need to focus on the front window, not the rearview mirror."

<u>Emily Moses</u> Community Service Chair "And we're going to have fun! Education should be fun. Students should love to learn and we should love to be there. It's nice to practice having fun. You can't force fun (to a round of laughs). Sure, we need to challenge the students, yet they need to enjoy the challenge and look forward to their journey."

Questions?

How's the insurance challenge coming along at NIC? "We're working through it. We'll reevaluate and move forward. We'll figure it out."

How's fall enrollment looking? "It's not where I'd like it to be. Enrollment is falling elsewhere, but in a growing community like ours? We need to figure out why? Is there a COVID effect? A 3-year break in the cycle? Maybe students see that wages are up and they don't need to continue with school? We need to change that mindset. Wages might be \$20 an hour, but you're not going to buy a house for \$20 an hour. Through education, they need to strive for much higher wages."

What are the top three things you're tackling? "Accreditation, board governance and how we replace senior leadership."

What's your vision for connecting with the community? "You have to get out and be in the community. Me! I need to be out there meeting with guidance counselors and principals. Meeting them personally!"

What about Theater? "I'm a fan of theater. Theater and the arts inspire us!"

How about veterans? "Veterans are a disciplined group, and in my whole 5-days on the job, I've learned that we have a veterans program. I'm a veteran and I'm going to learn from our veteran's affairs leader. We have good programs for veterans and we're going to be there for them."

What do you tell the youth, the kiddos? "Community Colleges are the democracy of socio economic status. Where else can you get secondary education for \$1,900 a year, and for many, get it paid through grants? We need to show our youth what's possible. Have them think about what's possible and work toward that."

Coeur d'Alene? "I see it's a warm community and I can feel how much you value NIC!"
