



RYLA -June 29 -July 6, 2024 (Rotary Youth

Leadership Awards - is a leadership program coordinated by Rotary Clubs around the globe. Individuals aged 14-30 attend events organized by the club's district committee. The specific format of these events may vary from district to district, but they typically consist of seminars, camps, or workshops focused on developing leadership skills.)

Location: University of Idaho Campus, Moscow, Idaho.

Cost: \$700 per student, payable at time of application.

Who: Open to young adults in the age range of 18-25.

Who can send: Each Rotary Club can send two attendees. Additional attendees can be placed on a waiting list. (We only accept applications through the clubs)

Transportation: Currently, transport is scheduled by the sponsoring Rotary Club. If you are part of the "Ryla Bus Route", there is a \$75 charge to pay for the bus and gas. (Route to be established)

Must Haves: Canadians must have a passport or documents to enter the US and return to Canada.

RECRUIT STUDENTS! Do you have a child or grandchild in this age range who could benefit from enhanced leadership skills?

How about someone you work with who could use a little boost in confidence and skill sets? Send them to RYLA with pay and it's a win-win for you both!

Progressing Toward Reaching its Foundation Contribution Goals?

Earlier this Rotary year, goals for contributions to the Annual Fund and the Polio Plus Fund were established with each active District 5080 Rotary and Rotaract Club.

Is your Foundation Chair tracking your club's progress in achieving these goals and reporting to the club members on this progress?

Annual Fund Goals

The 2023-2024 District-wide goal for Annual Fund Contributions is USD \$ 275,350. Contributions to date are at 99.13% of the planned goal.

21 Clubs have made contributions greater than 100% of their stated goal.

5 Clubs have made no contributions to the Annual Fund.

PolioPlus Fund Goals

The 2023-2024 District-wide goal for PolioPlus Fund Contributions is USD \$ 137,625. Contributions to date are at 34.1% of the planned goal.

4 Clubs have made contributions greater than 100% of their stated goal.

19 Clubs have made no contributions to the PolioPlus Fund.

The Rotary Club of Seoul-Hansoo, Korea, had about 100 members when Rotary Foundation Trustee Chun-Wook Hyun began his year as district governor nearly a decade ago. Determined to increase membership, district leaders developed a five-year strategic plan for future growth. By creating several satellite clubs â€" sub-units of Rotary clubs that meet on different days and times but otherwise share their identity with the original clubs â€" the Seoul-Hansoo club grew to 433 members. 

Polio mapping goes high-tech

When polio vaccinators fanned out across the Democratic Republic of the Congo last year to stop an outbreak, they carried a powerful new tool: cellphones that tracked their progress as they went from door to door. Equipped

with an



app, the phones send data back to a command center where staff can see missed homes on a digital map and redirect teams on the ground. The country is helping pioneer geospatial tracking to stop polio outbreaks. Vaccinators, trained by the World Health Organization, hit the streets in June 2023, armed with hundreds of phones, after an outbreak of vaccine-derived poliovirus type 1. A future where cervical cancer is not a threat

Dr. Rita Kalra leads Project Aastha, an initiative that vaccinates adolescent girls against the Human Papillomavirus (HPV). Through a comprehensive awareness campaign, the Rotary Club of Chandigarh Midtown, Haryana, India, has educated thousands of girls about the dangers of cervical cancer while vaccinating more than 500 girls. Kalra, a member of The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers, says it's about more than mere numbers: It's about building a shield around the girls to protect them from future health threats. 10 Things We Hope President Elects Learned About Peace at PETS



A Peacebuilder Action Team

- 1. Every Club should appoint a Peace Chair and a Peace Committee.
- 2. Each Club should ask each member to take the Rotary / IEP Positive Peace Workshop.
- 3.The Club should perform a community assessment to determine how to increase Peace and Resilience in their community.



- Every community has youth that need education in respecting all peoples, every Rotary Club should examine their Youth Services efforts for opportunities to upgrade them.
- 5. Every Community has groups that are disenfranchised, isolated, or not connected to the overall community, develop an outreach for inclusion project.
- 6. Each Club should consider becoming a Rotary Action Group for Peace (RAGFP) Peacebuilder Club and learn about the RAGFP.
- 7. Each RAGFP Peacebuilder Club should ask to be paired with a PB Club in another Country.
- 8. Each Club should ask to be connected with a Rotary Peace Fellow and/or a Rotary / IEP Positive Peace Ambassador or Activator.
- 9. Each Club should identify and recruit candidates for scholarships to become a Rotary Peace Fellow.
- 10. Each Club should connect with the District Peace Committee Chair. If the District does not have a Peace Chair, ask the District Governor to appoint one.
