The Girl Effect

The girl effect is a movement.

It's about leveraging the unique potential of adolescent girls to end poverty for themselves, their families, their communities, their countries and the world.



SITUATION

ON OUR HAND

THE GIRL EFFECT STATISTICS

- Approximately 12 million girls aged 15–19 years and at least 777,000 girls under 15 years give birth each year in developing regions.
- Complications during pregnancy and childbirth are the leading cause of death for 15–19-year-old girls globally.
- When a girl in the developing world receives seven or more years of education, she marries four years later and has 2.2 fewer children.
- An extra year of primary school boosts girls' eventual wages by 10 to 20
 %. An extra year of secondary school: 15 to 25 %.
- When women and girls earn income, they reinvest 90 % of it into the health, nutrition and educational needs of their families (as compared to only 30 to 40 % for men).


