
Wade Byers

Remembering Dee Denton

Rtn. Andrew Edwards shared with us a sad news of Dee's passing away on March 10th at her age 95.

Dee was the Executive Director of the Chamber of Commerce and retired from that position 25 years ago!

Dee was born in New York in 1926 and met her husband there during World War II. The couple had two sons, Michael and Dennis. In 1948, they moved to California where their daughter Trist was born. In 1961 the family moved up to the Pacific Northwest. Dee was not a typical stay-at-home mom, so she took on the role of Executive Director of LO Chamber of Commerce in 1963 and became the first female to do so!







She was first in many leadership roles. She was in the first group of women to be in LO Rotary and she was first to be in the group of Royal Rosarians. She was an important part Lake Oswego Festival of Arts, Tree Lighting, and numerous other activities. So, she essentially became a household name in Lake Oswego.

Dee's three important lessons in life were: (1) Don't take yourself too seriously, because no one else does, (2) All that truly matters in the end is you are loved, and (3) The best is yet to come.

Featured Speaker Lloyd Hill, ISC Chair



Topic: SAGE—Support for Adolescent Girls Empowerment



Lloyd was introduced by Rtn. Alan Bazzaz. Lloyd is a member of our Club since 2011. He is an Architect at his business called Hill Architects, Inc. specializing in hotels, resorts, mixed use multifamily buildings, and custom residential estates. Lloyd received his education at Cornell University (BARCH—

Architecture) and Harvard University Graduate School of Design.

His wife Kim has had a career in non-profit organizations and was an executive at the Mercy Corps. Kim and Lloyd together have a son Liam. Lloyd also have two daughters living in Colorado.

Lloyd is a 5th generation Oregonian. His ancestors came on a Wagon in 1852 and set home in Eugene near the Airport. He has a passion for humanitarian work and has been a member of ISC since he joined the Club. Lloyd has been very active and well known in the District for his international service around the world. With his passion for education, he has familiarized the concept of SAGE through the committee and adopted as an area of focus.

Lloyd provided an overview of ISC and how projects are selected for funding. He explained the mission of the Rotary Foundation and seven areas of fucus: promoting peace; fighting disease; providing clean water, sanitation and hygiene; saving mothers and children; supporting education; growing economies, and; protecting environment.

Lake Oswego Rotary Club has been supporting international humanitarian projects across the world in the Middle East, Asia, Africa, and Latin America.
