Tomorrow: Susan Windell, Past President and the Incoming President for 2024 of the local Chapter of the Philanthropic Educational Organization (P.E.O.)

Founded on January 21, 1869, P.E.O. was initiated by seven students at Iowa Wesleyan College in Mount Pleasant, Iowa. P.E.O. is renowned for its work in supporting women's education and professional development, offering scholarships, grants, awards, Ioans, and stewardship of Cottey College.

Local Ten Friends Team Effort A Solid Start To Future International Service

This story meets SRCâ€[™]s mission of service - and the connection of that service not only for our community - but international service - and in this case, highlighting the connection of our support to a nonprofit located here - and the business Pema and Nurbu run here in High Camp - with the international element.

Sisters Rotary Club provides the funding for a local nonprofit to buy backpacks for children in Tilahe Nepal.

Sisters Rotary continues its support of the Sisters-based nonprofit Ten Friends. Ten Friends was founded by Mark LaMont and Rand Runko, two Sisters School District teachers, over 17 years ago after taking trips to Nepal guided by Nurbu Sherpa. Ten Friends currently focuses on funding an orphanage, a school for young women, and establishment of libraries in remote villages in Nepal.

A new initiative lead by the owners of High Camp Himalayan Food and Taphouse in Sisters, Nurbu and Pema Sherpa, joined Ten Friends earlier this year. This



new initiative led by Nurbu and Pema focuses on the education of children and vocational skills development of young adults in the village of Tilahe, Nepal. During a trip to Tilahe in October of 2023, Pema and Nurbu provided the children with backpacks purchased with a donation provided by the Sisters Rotary Club. The joy and excitement of the children as they opened their backpacks and explored the school supplies within was captured in the photos below, along with their expression of gratitude to those that made the gift possible.

SRF Assists Family Friendly Restroom Team Effort

In Sisters, Oregon, the **Family Friendly Restroom Team**, (an Age Friendly Sisters Country action team), initiative is making local business bathrooms more family-friendly by installing diaper changing tables. This effort, led by Kellen Klein and Jane Cartwright, provides free sourcing and installation of changing tables, along with other amenities like handwashing stools and diaper starter packs.

The Rotary Club of Sisters has generously donated \$250 towards an upcoming changing station. Initial funding was supported by

Citizens4Community's Momentum Grant and the City of Sisters Community Grant. The program aims to add 15 more installations this year, with each costing about \$250, funded through donations.

Here is a thank you and update from Klein: "Thanks again for the donation of \$250to Family Friendly Restrooms. Quick update on diaper changing stations â€" the article and a subsequent Facebook post I made got us some good attention! We now have likely changing stations in the queue for Sisters Depot, Martolli's Pizza, Sisters Meat and Smokehouse, and maybe the Dino Market. We also got a contractor to donate installation services, so Rotary's donation will go even further and might be able to fund two changing stations. Thanks again for your support!"

Klein and Cartwright are also working on developing a map of changing stations in Sisters Country and an "action toolkit" to inspire similar initiatives in other communities.
