Mick Zdeblick, CEO of Asante Rogue Regional.

Topic: Heimann Cancer Center

Summary of last week's topic:

Mick presented on the new Heimann Cancer Center that consolidates cancer care to improve the experience and care for patients and families. Cancer is the leading cause of death in Southern

Oregon with more than 2,000 people diagnosed annually. Currently care is excellent, but fragmented requiring patients to travel to multiple locations to receive care. The three floor center provides easier navigation with advanced diagnostics and physician offices on the first floor, medical oncology offices, nurses, social work, laboratories and a lounge on the second floor and infusion, pharmacy, research and conference space for physician teams on the third floor. The infusion area has both a private setting and a social setting depending on the patients preference. A new pediatric oncology clinic will be within the hospital with specialized treatment rooms. The clinic would not be possible without the philanthropic gifts raising \$7.5 million of the \$10 million so far including a generous \$5 million gift from Mary and Dick Heimann. The new care center will be open in late 2023.

A two-story facility is also being renovated in Grants Pass improving oncology services in Josephine County and surrounding rural areas. The facility will include an expanded infusion center, supportive services with social workers and dieticians, a new CT scanner and more to provide integrated care in one location. This facility will be open in late 2021.

Asante has been identified nationally in the Top 15 Health Centers for 8 years in a row and recently identified in the Top 50 Cardiac Hospitals.

Rotary Foundation s Polio Plus program, By Eric Hodnett, Co-Chair S Polio Committee

District 5110 places an emphasis on Polio during the month of February. With that in mind I thought I would share some information from a recent issue of the Rotary Magazine.

You may wonder what your donations to the Rotary Foundation so Polio Plus program go toward. One-month last year the Rotary Foundation approved the following grants:

- 19,306 vehicles were hired for frontline workers in Afghanistan
- 90 million doses of oral vaccine
- 12,139 vaccinators were trained in Sudan
- 2,530 community health workers recruited in Pakistan

Remember, all donations to the Rotary Foundation Polio Plus account are matched 2 to 1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. A \$100 donation generates \$300 toward polio eradication.

Finally, it has been recognized how valuable the polio eradication infrastructure is for other medical responses. Currently this infrastructure is being used in many countries for their Covid-19 response. We should all be proud of that as well.
