

JANICE BURGESS SHARES PE INTERESTS





President Joe leads first official Board meeting on July 6 by Judy Corwin

Joe Kosanovic led his first board meeting July 6 as Redmond Rotary president. The meeting was held at Junction Coffee conference room and called to order at 5:30 p.m. Minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed and approved.

Marv Kaplan and Becky Lu Hummer presented the Treasurer's Report for the period ending June 30, 2022. Rotarian Kaplan is transitioning treasurer duties to Rotarian Hummer. As the new treasurer, Beckly Lu explained the transition is delayed a bit, but going smoothly. There was discussion among the board as to how the budget information was formatted, and Kaplan explained the sources, tracking and balancing processes for the report. New members learned that member and accountant Craig Brooks reviews the accounts annually to ensure fiscal integrity.

Committee reports included:

- A brief discussion about the status of the Newhouse scholarship including a request for communication;
- A Dec. 17 date for the club's Christmas Party at the Falls Club House in Eagle Crest;
- A report on the club's participation with RYLA, as well as the desire to sponsor an Interact Club at Ridgeview High School;

- An update on the transition of Public Image and Communications to Judy Corwin and Tim Trainor;
- An update on membership from Chair Marv Kaplan, and
- A discussion about Rotary grants for 2022-23. Club members were planning to attend the District Grants Committee on July 9 and:
- Committee reports are still pending on the Desert Rose Golf Classic.

In Old Business, President Joe distributed a Spokesman Review Advertisement which the club agreed to support as the Redmond Spokesman is re-establishing. In addition, Berry Sales are going well and will be available for pick-up on July 15. Lastly, the club continues its volunteer activities with the Deschutes County Fair, Aug. 3-7, coordinated through scheduling by Rotarians Tyler Nokes and Keever Henry. This event is the major fund-raiser and activity that the club has committed to each year. ALL Redmond Rotarians are encouraged to volunteer.

In new business, Deschutes fair training was announced for the club's July 21 and 28 meetings. Wild Ride MX13 Jump Show will be held Aug. 25 in Redmond. The club hopes to raise \$10,000 to contribute toward the Central Oregon Veterans Ranch.

Because of Aug. 2nd National Night Out, the next board meeting will be held Aug. 1, instead of Aug. 2. All are welcome to attend in person or by Zoom.

officers showed off abilities and personalities of their K9 counterparts, Maverick and Rogue. Luckily, all Rotarians left their hard drugs at home!

Officers showed off the differences between the two dogs. One had been trained to sniff out hard drugs hidden in rooms, vehicles and even outdoor environments. The second was trained to bring down human subjects.



Rotarians peppered the trainers with questions — everything from what they eat to how long their careers can range. Truly nothing like a dog to pep up a crowd! And both officers thanked the club for their efforts in securing funds to help pay for this expensive but effective piece of police equipment.



In 2019, the Redmond Rotary — in partnership with Wild Ride and the Redmond Police Department — helped raise \$10,000 to purchase and train the one of the pups. The funds were raised mostly through MX13's Metal Mulisha event that summer.

The dollars helped bring the K-9 unit to Redmond, and the dog is now under the care and control of Officer Chris Barber.

MEET ROTARY INTERNATIONAL'S FIRST FEMALE PRESIDENT



Jennifer Jones, Rotary International's first female president, is the perfect leader to spread the word about the good Rotary does in the world, and inspire its members to keep going.

Jones, 55, was born in Windsor, Ontario, and — save for a few postcollege years working in the Turks and Caicos Islands and Manhattan has lived there her whole life. The

oldest of three children, she'd run lemonade stands to earn money to give to charity, and recalls organizing a carnival in her family's yard to benefit kids with muscular dystrophy. "Growing up, my parents had given us wings to do service in our community," she says. Today, her mom, dad, and one of her brothers and his wife are Rotarians. Her other brother created a painting that inspired Jones' presidential-theme ties and scarves.Jones started her own television production company when she was in her late 20s, wowing bank officials with her business plan, negotiating a lease, and investing in hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of equipment. "I've always wanted to carve my own path," she says. "Sometimes that's meant taking risks and making yourself open to new experiences."

One of those was Rotary. As a rookie radio reporter in the late 1980s, she'd covered the organization and remembers attending club meetings where the members were nearly all men. "I remember feeling very intimidated by the experience," she says. "I was in my early 20s. It was the power brokers of the community." Fast forward to 1996, months after she'd started her business, Media Street Productions. The manager of the local cable station invited Jones to a meeting. She realized she had found her home. "It was clearly one of the greatest gifts I've ever received," she says. "I didn't think walking through the door that day that it would change the trajectory of my life."
