President's Message

Sometimes the small things matter most.

Last Wednesday evening, I arrived home and realized I didn't have keys to get into the house. Fortunately, Martha was home and opened the door in response to my knock. I searched my pockets, checked the car **but still no keys**. I realized I must have dropped them at the Springfield Chamber of Commerce open house while exchanging business cards.

So I called the after-hours number at the Chamber, asking if anyone had turned in lost keys, and leaving my name and number. Then I remembered that Rotarian **Tammy Inglis-Drew** had been serving at one of the open house information tables and I called her. She didn't know about the keys but said Rotarian **Mary Ann Reilly** (the Chamber's program & events manager) would know more and offered to call her and let me know. A few minutes later, I got a text from Tammy: "**Your keys are at the Chamber office.**" The next morning, I got a call from **Bre Boersma** at the Chamber office confirming that my keys were there ready for pickup.



Yes, missing keys are a small thing, but **they can be a cause of big uncertainty and anxiety** until their location is known. I felt thoroughly cared for and supported throughout this search process. I was grateful for the alertness of the person noticing the keys, the responsible care to keep them safe in the office, and the responsiveness of Tammy, Mary Ann, and Bre to put my mind at ease.

The alertness of the person noticing the lost keys reminded me of a project I started over 30 years ago to teach character qualities to our children. For example, *Alertness* (vs. Carelessness) is "Being aware of what is taking place around me so I can have the right responses." My goal was to work with our children on 49 character qualities over the years, starting with *Kindness, Obedience, and Respect*. The project was more challenging than I expected; it seemed like years later we were still working on *Kindness, Obedience, and Respect*!

I have also used the 49 qualities in my work life over the years. For example, I have asked staff to identify the top 10 they believe are important for the success of our operation, then we focused on the top priority as part of our monthly staff meeting. A few of my favorites among the top 10 were:

Decisiveness (vs. Procrastination) – The ability to recognize key factors and finalize difficult decisions.

- Persuasiveness (vs. Contentiousness) Guiding vital truths around another's mental roadblocks.
- Truthfulness (vs. Deception) Earning future trust by accurately reporting past facts.
- Initiative (vs. Idleness) Recognizing and doing what needs to be done before I am asked to do it.

At that time, I was not familiar with the **Rotary 4-Way Test**. Now I marvel at the wisdom and usefulness of the 4-Way Test. If I had it to do again, I would include the **4-Way Test** as the heart of any character development project, both at home and at work.

Thank you to Tammy, Mary Ann, Bre, and all of you for how you have benefited my life, in both small ways and bigger ways. **Keep up the great work!**

Presenter and Presentation Title: Michael (Mike) Booth DVM; "A Brief Introduction to Food Safety"

Brief Description of Presentation:

The nation's food supply is only as safe as the hands that prepare it, from the field to the table. In the next few minutes I hope to draw open the curtain surrounding what happens to your food before you purchase it and how to protect yourself and your family from the harmful effects of poor processing, insanitary handling/shipping/storage, or improper preparation.

Bio of Presenter:

I consider myself a lifelong Oregonian, although I was born in San Diego. I attended Centennial High School near Gresham and entered the Air Force Academy in the summer of 1971. After figuring out I was not of the warrior ilk, I entered Oregon State University in the Fall of 1972, declaring microbiology as my major. I went on to Veterinary School at Colorado State University, graduating in 1980, the day after Mt. St. Helens erupted.

I practiced small animal medicine, with a special interest in veterinary dentistry, for 30 years. I ended my practice career after joining the USDA Food Safety Inspection Service (FSIS) in 2010. I retired from FSIS as a Front Line Supervisor here in Eugene in December 2023.


